Sustainable agricultural solutions? Innovative projects sought

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is seeking proposals to fund up to \$75 million in new, unique projects under the Regional Conservation Partnership Program's (RCPP) Alternative Funding Arrangements (AFA). These arrangements are intended to take innovative and non-traditional approaches to conservation solutions at the local, regional and landscape scales. In making selections, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will prioritize projects related to climate smart agriculture and forestry.

NRCS will fund up to 15 projects this year through AFA,

where partners have more flexibility in working directly with agricultural producers to support the development of new conservation structures and approaches that would not otherwise be effectively implemented through the classic RCPP.

"Collaboration and partnership are leading to advanced conservation delivery on working lands, both rural and urban,"

said Terry Cosby, Acting Chief of NRCS. "We want to continue funding projects that harness the power of partnership and innovation to develop solutions that benefit producers while conserving our natural resources."

A significant portion of funds will address projects related to climate smart agriculture and forestry. These include

projects related to carbon markets and new technologies. NRCS also strongly encourages proposals from RCPP projects that address the conservation

NRCS is accepting AFA project proposals now through May 28. Proposals must be submitted through the RCPP portal at <https://nrcs-sites.secure.force.com/>. Information about this request for proposals is available on [grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov).

AFA projects were initially authorized under the 2014 Farm Bill. The 2018



needs of urban farmers in metropolitan areas, supporting access to healthy fresh food in historically underserved populated communities.

NRCS will execute AFAs through agreements with eligible lead partners who will be responsible for contracting directly with eligible producers and landowners to implement conservation activities on the ground. In Kane County, the Kane County Environmental & Water Resources Department is a potential eligible lead partner. Farmers or groups with project ideas are

Farm Bill enhanced the AFA provision and authorized NRCS to award up to 15 AFA projects annually. Project types that may be suited to AFAs, as highlighted by the 2018 Farm Bill statute include:

- Projects that use innovative approaches to leverage the federal investment in conservation.
- Projects that deploy a pay-for-performance conservation approach.
- Projects that seek large-scale infrastructure investment that

Need credits or education for a job in agriculture?

As a not-for-profit established with a primary mission to support scholarships and education for the future of farms and food, the KCFB Foundation Board of Directors has distributed hundreds of thousands of dollars in support of college scholarships, agricultural literacy programs, and agricultural leadership education. Foundation funding has also included support of the local community through the University of Illinois Extension, 4-H and local FFA programs, and it has been a leader in raising local hunger awareness and helping coordinate programs for local hunger relief.

More recently, the KCFB Foundation turned its attention to continuing education and the need for farmer training for existing, new and beginning farmers. And while the Farm

Adult Continuing Education funding available through KCFB Foundation

Bureau and its affiliated companies and organizations offer many opportunities for producers of livestock, commodities and specialty crops to learn through statewide conferences and workshops, no single association's offerings can be comprehensive.

To fill the potential voids in learning opportunities, the KCFB Foundation first approved an Adult Continuing Education funding budget in 2019. Funds were made available to support Farm Bureau member attendance at courses, conferences, training and professional development events, not sponsored by Farm Bureau, that advance education for the future of farms and food here in Kane County.

The Foundation has developed an application and review process, with applications due 60 days before the start of any

course of study or conference attendance. A review committee makes final decisions on all funding requests.

A "Continuing Education Funding Request" application is posted at www.kanecfb.com. Funding for any course, workshop, etc. is limited to half of the enrollment, registration or tuition fee, and to \$250 per KCFB regular or professional membership per year. It is also limited to one-time only course enrollment or conference attendance. No successive attendance at annual conferences will be considered.

generate conservation benefits for agricultural producers and nonindustrial private forest owners.

The fiscal 2021 AFA funding announcement incorporates policy updates following publication of the RCPP final rule, including:

- The revised RCPP Critical Conservation Areas (announced in August 2020).
- Updated RCPP AGI waiver policy.
- Clarifying language about when RCPP activities can be carried out on public lands.
- New policy language developed for AFA easements.
- New policy language to highlight that producer "cost-share" funding related to implementation of conserva-

tion activities, like land management practices or systems,

cannot be counted as partner contributions for the project.


The County of Kane has received grant funding to test tile drainage and other non-point sources to help farmers and others evaluate management practices and meet water quality goals. One of the Division's primary goals in recent years has been to assist farmers in the reactivation of drainage districts in an effort to preserve farmland and its productive capacity.

dents are doing in Kane County.





Corn, soybeans and high tech



1. Field map: Farmers upload all their field maps to an iPad with guidance lines. This allows them to double-check that they are using the right field map on the planter monitor before planting the field.
2. Tractor functions: Similar to your car's "check engine" light, when something goes wrong on the tractor, this is the screen that alerts the farmer.
3. Planter activity: This monitor controls the auto-steer and allows farmers to control seed spacing, plant population, and seed to soil contact – all imperative to getting a plant to grow.
4. Insecticide placement: Based on what the soil needs in specific areas, farmers can control how much insecticide is placed in furrows and on the soil as they move through the field.

Farmers have a common goal: To make a living and to care for their land, which has often been in their families for generations. They have a commitment to getting maximum yield from their fields while caring for the environment that sustains their livelihood. Modern technology helps the current generation in this quest. Here are some of the modern tools farmers use.

GPS links in tractors and combines guide farmers through the fields with more precision than was previously possible. Crops are precisely planted and after harvest, farmers can download the GPS data they've accumulated and analyze it to plan for cover crops, fertilizer and planting next spring.

DRONES allow farmers to view, or oversee their fields in a few minutes, rather than hours. That rapid overview can help tremendously in surveying insect or storm damage and in checking the overall health of crops.

THE CLOUD allows farmers to upload info and retrieve easily. That data can be analyzed over the winter, giving farmers an accurate "map" for applying fertilizer or pesticides only where they are needed.

Food for hard-working farmers

- Ingredients**
- (1) 12 count package Hawaiian sweet rolls
 - 3/4 pound roast beef, thinly sliced
 - 3/4 pound extra sharp cheddar cheese, thinly sliced
 - 1 stick butter, melted
 - 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
 - 1/2 tablespoon poppy seeds (optional)
 - 2 teaspoons minced dried onion
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper

- Directions**
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 9X13" baking pan with foil, and spray with non-stick cooking spray. Set aside.
 - Open the rolls from their package, slide out the roll tray, and slice rolls in half, so roll tops

are in one "sheet", and roll bottoms are in another "sheet". Place the sheet of bottoms in the prepared baking dish.



Layer half of the roast beef on the rolls, then layer all of the cheese, and top cheese with remaining half of roast beef. Top

with the sheet of the tops. Set aside.

Melt the butter in a small microwave safe bowl, about a minute. Whisk in the Worcestershire sauce, mustard, poppy seeds (optional), onion, salt, and pepper. Evenly pour this over the tops of the rolls. Cover with foil, and allow to rest (soak up the goodness!) for 10 minutes.

Bake covered for 20 minutes, remove the foil, and bake for another 5 to 8 minutes. Slice into individual sliders, and serve!

To keep the sliders warm on the go or for quick meals for spring fieldwork – wrap them individually in tinfoil or wrap the whole pan in a towel and enjoy with a side of chips and an apple!

DIY phone stand from recycled TP rolls

- Materials**
- 1 toilet paper roll
 - Washi tape
 - 4 push pins (tacks)
 - Markers
 - Cutter or exacto-knife
 - Craft scissors

- Directions**
- 1) Place your phone over the toilet paper roll and trace around it to mark the hole where the phone will stand once the holder is complete and cut out the marked hole
 - 2) Cover and wrap the Washi tape around the entire roll (You'll notice it will make a small hollow which is good as it will help you with the next steps)
 - 3) Mark a dot about 1" away

from the middle of the edge of the hole. Do the same on the other side too. Then draw a line between the 2 dots and connect them.

4) Connect each dot with the corners of the hole (from step 1), draw a line so you form a "V" and repeat on the other end.

5) Using a cutting tool or small scissors, cut along the line and each side of the "V" and repeat for the other end.

6) Press the disconnected Washi tape strip towards the inside and tape it to the toilet paper roll (on the inside) and repeat for other end.

7) Now press each "V" towards the inside and tape them to the toilet paper roll.

8) Add some finishing touches by adding Washi tape around each edge by taping it around the toilet paper roll half way only, then push the tape (the half hanging off) towards the inside and tape to the toilet paper roll or decorate as you see fit!

9) Add 2 push pins at both

Phones planted like pliers in farmer pockets

I still remember the spring when an unnamed farmer attempted to grow a crop of cell phones.

While outside the tractor cab in the field, he had dropped then driven over his two-week-old cell phone twice. Once with a planter and soon after with a tillage implement that placed it subsurface like a seed.

The soil rang. He found the phone. The dirty flip phone (this

was 2009) could dial the local equipment dealership with a breakdown. However, the shattered screen left him unable to read a text message about the commodity markets. A new phone soon suspended from a bungee cord on his collar, safe keeping for a device that farmers, like most Americans, find too important to go without.

Cell phones, and specifically smartphones, have arguably surpassed the importance of pliers to the daily farmer attire. The tool has yet to tightly wire a gate, but it wields the power to access everything from local weather to global agriculture markets at our sometimes-soiled fingertips.

Grandpa, who farmed with literal horsepower in childhood, never imagined a handheld device could text and email business partners and display

instant radar images, yet function as a flashlight. Remotely, we can control the grain dryer and monitor the solar array's energy production. Apps on the device deliver field-by-field rainfall totals, timely agriculture podcasts and virtual farm teleconferences. Smartphones grant rural families the conveniences any modern American families employ, such as online shopping, restaurant pickup orders, voice-guided navigation and live virtual access to anything allowed.

From the bleachers at a home basketball game, my daughter and I watched a calf's birth via live video footage from barn cameras at the home farm. We found true delight in witnessing the little heifer stand within 30 minutes and gallop about the straw in another 10.

The smartphone provides

our camera, calendar and calculator. It replaced the dinner bell for summoning family members from the barnyard and, quite precisely, can track their location out in the fields. It provides a hotspot for homework, a device to fill downtime and an app to identify constellations on a starry summer night.

The future likely will bring more exciting conveniences and practical uses, but for now, a key function on our farm remains conversation, both

business and social. The same phone that calls the local grain elevator to market corn also orders the Sunday night pizza. It texts a question about production records and reaches relatives seldom seen when planting season peaks, assuming no one plants the device and needs a replacement.

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Farm Bureau 2021 State Legislative Priorities

- Seek to maintain the tax policy provisions that currently exist in Illinois that provide economic stability for the agricultural industry including the agricultural sales tax exemptions for seed, feed, fertilizer/chemicals, and equipment.
- Work to maintain adequate state funding for key Illinois Department of Agriculture programs like meat/poultry/egg inspectors, environmental programs, warehouse oversight, and veterinarian programs. This includes advocating for a viable and independent Illinois Department of Agriculture.
- Maintain a balanced process for siting livestock farms through the Livestock Management Facilities Act (LMFA) that protects both the environment and farmers' ability to raise livestock.
- Support legislation limiting liability on agritourism for inherent risks.
- Support the expansion and enhancement of high-speed broadband while protecting the private property rights of farmers during the installation, maintenance, and upgrading of current services.
- Engage in renewable energy policy discussions to minimize the negative impact to agriculture and to promote the use of renewable fuels as a solution for reducing emissions from the transportation sector.
- Support Biofuels markets through programs that encourage the use of ethanol and soybean-based biodiesel.
- Support Illinois Farmer Mental Health Assistance Program.
- Educate members of the General Assembly on the importance of the Farmland Assessment Law.

Master Gardeners open e-help desk for 2021
