## Association seeks director candidates

2022 Nominating Committee of the Kane County Farm Bureau held its first meeting in mid-February to learn about bylaw and organizational policy changes regarding Director elections, to interview potential candidates for a May ballot and to discuss the needs of the organization from a governance perspective.

KCFB relies on a 5-person nominating committee composed of non-Directors. The organization seeks nominating committee members to provide diversity in geography, age, experience and gender, as well as size and type of farming operations. The committee is encouraged to seek the same in candidates to place on the ballot for election to the organization's governing Board.

For elections in 2022 and beyond, the organization's bylaws allow for at-large elections, rather than representation by township or district. Up to 5 Directors will be elected for three-year terms from ballots mailed to regular voting (farmer and farmland owner) members

At their initial meeting, the committee interviewed incumbent directors who wish to seek re-election, as well as new candidates who wish to have their name appear on the ballot. They also identified potential candidates to stand for election and assigned responsibility for making contacts to committee members.

KCFB nominating and electing policies allow for any regular voting member to submit eli-

gible candidate names to the Nominating Committee, up to 45 days prior to the scheduled mailing of election ballots. For 2022, that deadline is April 5.

## Livestock value shared with public

In a February email to state legislators, the Kane County Board, and County elected and appointed officials, Kane County Farm Bureau shared information on livestock's impact at the local level. The information comes from LINK, Illinois Farm Bureau's bimonthly publication of Local Information, News and Know-

The 11-page publication included information on supporting food security, protecting the environment, driving economic growth and strengthening communities. It also shared stories and profiles of livestock farms and meat processors around the state.

The publication comple-

ments a recent Farm Bureau effort to help provide FREE training and certification to small meat processors to meet HACCP (Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points) safety guidelines and requirements. That training was offered by Illinois Farm Bureau in cooperation with Texas A&M University in January and February to encourage local meat processing and to help defray the costs of area meat processors. Farm Bureau will evaluate the need to repeat the training, or host in-person training at the local level, over the coming months.

Farm Bureau also shared information culled from the USDA Census of Agriculture and other sources on the value of agriculture (including livestock) to the Kane County economy. Kane County's 1,008 farmers produced a farm gate value \$181.3 million in farm products in 2017. However, those products also provide 14,177 local jobs. The farm products, processing and other jobs they create add \$1.450 billion to the economy. And did you know, Kane County is Illinois' leading producer of Nursery and Greenhouse crops, floriculture and sod?





## **Funding available thru April 15** from Partners for Conservation

The Kane-DuPage Soil & Water Conservation District (KDSWCD) is accepting applications for their Partners for Conservation cost-share program. There are \$8,000 remaining in funds for this year.

Projects eligible for funding include best management practices, such as; cover crops, notill/strip till, conservation cover, critical areas planting, grassed

waterways, grade stabilization structures, pollinator habitats, raingardens and much more. The program pays for up to 75% of a projects total cost or the state average cost (whichever is lower).

The project must not have started work, and must be complete by December 31, 2022. Projects are not eligible for PFC if other cost-share dollars are being received. All interested applicants should email patrick.mcpartlan@kane dupageswcd.org for the application form and state average costs for each practice.

The application deadline is April 15th. All applicants will be presented to and selected by the KDSWCD Board Directors.

#### Hello Kane County!

For those of you who recall from my previous columns, I grew up on the east side of Sycamore out in the country with parents and three siblings. Joanie Stier's column this month (page 6) has me reflecting on the country roads that I grew up on as a kid and the appreciation and comfort they continue to provide to me now as an adult.

I consider myself fortunate to have grown up surrounded by rural roads, the people along them, and the endless life lessons learned along the way that have definitely shaped the woman I am today. As you may have guessed, I, like my family, like to stay busy so there was always something to do, especially outside, no matter the season. Whether it was practicing that specific season's sport and having to add more layers to stay warm, riding my bike alongside my mom while she went for a run, or riding on the back of my dad's four-wheeler supervising him while he did his evening pig chores, there was

always a reason to get outside.

Once the time came for me to go away to college, adjusting my scenery and comfort-zone was a learning process. While it was good to step outside my comfort zone for that moment of time, the appreciation I had for the roads I grew up on was made stronger. There was nothing like coming home for a short weekend visit and hitting the corner of Old State Road, being comforted by the sight of open fields, fresh air and feeling of, "Ah... I'm home!"

I can recall right around this time, two years ago when the country roads provided a whole new world to me. It can be easy sometimes to get caught up in the hustle and bustle and stress of everyday life when we are constantly surrounded by 24-7 news outlets and glued to our cellphones with hours of endless distractions. The feeling of being able to step outside into a world where none of that noise mattered and being able to disconnect was just what I needed. When it felt like the world was upside down, stepping outside provided a whole new sense of comfort and reassurance that everything was going to be okay. Every single day, rain or shine, I looked forward to taking the dogs for a walk. Just us and the open road. Out there the world was quiet, the scenery was picture perfect, and company was even better. My daily

Any farm kid knows, there are some tough life lessons to be learned along the way of raising and showing livestock just the same way any athlete knows the characteristics and lessons learned and developed through sports carry over into other areas of your life. It is so fun for me to see them learn and grow in a similar fashion that we did growing up along these rural roads. Whether it was teaching my first nephew Hudson how to hit a ball, watching Benett fall in love with caring and tending to the animals, or seeing the joy on their little faces when they go for a "ride" it fills me with me so much happiness to see them learn, explore, and make lasting memories that will forever shape them as it did with my family and I.



#### Egg carton flowers craft

April may bring showers, but who says you can't brighten your day with flowers before May? And you can even re-use your egg cartons after you've dyed and painted your Easter eggs! Try this easy egg carton flower craft & make someone's day today!

#### Supplies

Canvas: 9x12 Mod Podge Sparkle Egg Carton (not foam) Paint Scissors Pipe Cleaners (green) Ribbon **Buttons** Craft glue Paintbrush

#### Instructions

Paint the canvas with any color of your choice, paint several coats and let dry. Cut up the egg carton. Each egg container is going to be a flower bud. Cut right down the middle and remove the



excess areas. Trim the edge of the carton to create petals.

Paint the egg carton "flowers" with the paint colors of your choice. Paint several coats and set aside to dry.

Once they are dry, coat with Sparkle Mod Podge.

Trim pipe cleaners to the right length and tie them together for a stem. Glue to the canvas with craft glue.

Glue a button in the center of each flower, then glue the flower to the canvas on top of the pipe cleaner stems and let it dry.

Let the canvas dry completely before hanging & admire your floral creation!

## Easy pigs in a blanket

April 24th is National Pigs in a Blanket Day and what better way to celebrate than with this Easy Pigs in a Blanket recipe!

#### Ingredients

- 1 (12oz) package of cocktail franks
- 2 (8oz) tubes of refrigerated crescent dough
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 6 tablespoons salted butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

#### Directions

Preheat the oven to 375°. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Unroll the crescent dough, lay it on a work surface and brush the whole thing with Dijon mustard. Cut each triangle in half lengthwise to create two skinner triangles.

Place one frank on each wide end of the dough, then roll up and arrange on a prepared sheet in two concentric circles making sure all of the piggies (the dough) on both circles touch

Combine the melted butter with the Italian seasoning and garlic powder. Brush the butter mixture on the pigs in blankets. Bake until golden brown, 18 to 22 minutes. Serve with ketchup and mustard and enjoy!

#### **Dusty Truth**

Roads (gravel ones included) key part of food supply chain

A West Coast cousin is guaranteed to call out "rush hour," when more than one car passes the farmyard during our annual game of wiffle ball. Since childhood, we have played a ball game every year that our city cousins visit the farm. Now adults, they still poke fun at the traffic pattern of primarily the mailman and some neighbors who wave as they pass.

Back home in the city, my cousins travel well-lit residential streets and expressways. Out

here in the heart of farm country, few roads are lined. Certain stretches of our rural roads may become impassable in winter. Road curves can measure nearly

90 degrees, and some intersections of narrow gravel roads lack stop signs, relatively common in Illinois' most rural, low-traffic settings. That's just a fact of living in rural, more remote areas.

Urban and rural alike, Illinoisians try to get from point A to point B for jobs, school, business and social events. Road infrastructure proves important to all Illinois businesses with goods to move, families with places to go, and workers with jobs to complete. In an urban setting, people most commonly travel lined asphalt or concrete highways. In rural areas, unstriped blacktops and dusty gravel road connect us to destinations, including the fields that produce food, feed, and bio

The primary difference is that rural roads, generally, are made of less durable materials than urban or high-traffic county roads. And that reduced durability can limit activity. In the late winter and spring when the frost exits the subsoil, rural roads begin to soften and weight restrictions impact the movement of commodities from the farm to market. In the summer heat, oil-and-chipped roads can bleed, demanding more roadchips, or small rocks, to protect the surface.

About a mile south and a bit east of our wiffle ball game, the one-lane bridge sits crooked to the road. The Laura Blacktop near town has a crumbling shoulder. And you'll want to avoid my road in the thaw of March unless you desire the unofficial title of "most deserving" in the car wash line. While in high school, I wrote well wishes in the gravel grime on my car for our state-bound basketball team. I'm not sure that I made my city cousins jealous.

## Get your soil ready for spring

Kane County Farm Bureau offers soil testing to its members at a discount, a great service the Farm to make sure your soil is ready for spring planting. Three different tests available and results are sent by e-mail or mail directly to you. Prices listed are for Kane County Farm Bureau members, non-members, and PLUS status members. Ask us how to save even more when you upgrade your membership to a PLUS status.

Why test your soil? Soil in its natural state is rarely fertile enough for the best growth of plants. Usually it is necessary to replenish the earth's store of plant nutrients to obtain the most vigorous lawn, the most abundant and brilliant flowers, the prettiest trees and shrubs and the greatest yield of fresh veggies.

When is the best time to test soil? Proper sampling is important to obtain accurate results. Samples can be taken any time during the warmer months, when soil temperatures are at least 55 degrees. If the soil is too wet to spade, rototill or hoe, it is generally too wet to take a sample. On the other hand, extremely dry soil should

not be sampled either.

How often should I test? Ideally, soil should be tested every 3-5 years, more frequently with intensive use. Try to sample during the same season each time for the best compari-

Why does Farm Bureau provide this service? Kane County Farm Bureau was founded in 1912 as the Kane County Farm Improvement Association, to help farmers improve their production practices and increase the fertility and productivity of their soil. This program is an extension of that. It helps you take the guess work out of gardening!


