

November KCFB Board report

To keep Farm Bureau members informed of the activities, discussions and actions of the organization, the report below is provided when space and time permits in the Kane County Farmer. While not official minutes of the meeting(s), this report is intended to keep members up to date on programs and issues of interest to members and the organization.

The Kane County Farm Bureau Board of Directors met Thursday, November 10 with perfect attendance of Directors between in-person and remote meeting options.

Directors approved a consent agenda of minutes, membership reports and financial reports as well as routine annual contracts and agreements before welcoming Country Financial Elgin-St. Charles Agency Manager Jeffrey Orman for a report on the Agency's products, services, production and manpower.

In director reports, the economy, supply chain disruptions, and inflation were continuing concerns shared by the directors. Other concerns included comments on the need for domestic production of industrial products and especially computer chips, and that the farm labor supply is the worst it has ever been.

Directors reviewed an anticipated policy resolution regarding Energy as part of IFB Policy #12 on Utilities and Pipelines. Directors also received a November report of statewide "policy submittals and their disposition" by the IFB Resolutions Committee. Voting delegates and alternates to the Illinois Farm Bureau annual meeting were invited to a late November

District-wide meeting to discuss policy proposal submitted by members from around the state.

In old business, the 2022 IFB annual meeting was discussed. Mike Kenyon was approved as a delegate to that meeting to replace Dale Pitstick who has family obligations on the meeting dates. KCFB Vice-President Wayne Schneider and spouse Lisa will attend the 2023 American Farm Bureau Federation's annual meeting to be held January 6th through 11th in San Juan, PR. Directors were reminded of a December 2 deadline to register.

Management reported on the publication of a proposed bylaw amendment to allow members classified as "Professional Members" to serve on the Board of Directors. Publication will allow the Board of Directors to vote on the amendment at their December meeting.

Directors discussed and voted to retain counsel to represent the KCFB in a contract dispute before receiving a report of Harvest decorations sales conducted by the KCFB staff to support the KCFB Foundation's scholarship and ag literacy programs.

Directors also discussed proposed amendments to the Kane County Code, Chapters 12 and 15, as presented to the Kane County Judicial and Public Safety Committee. It was reported that the Chair of that committee declined to move both resolutions forward on November 2 at the County Executive Committee meeting, to allow additional comments. After discussion of the impacts on local farms, a motion to notify the JPS Chair and County Sheriff "that KCFB is opposed

to both amendments in their present form" was approved.

Correspondence with legislators who had achieved the IFB ACTIVATOR "Friend Agriculture" designation was shared with the Board.

In new business, directors learned of the KCFB Foundation's acquisition of a 1965 International Harvester D900 step-side pick-up truck for their 2023 Vintage Truck Raffle. The KCFB Foundation Board will set ticket prices at a late November meeting.

Directors offered suggestions on priorities for the Illinois Farm Bureau Board of Directors to focus on in 2023. Those included supply chain issues and input costs, an increase in and extension of the estate tax exemption due to rapid inflation, and steps to address the farm labor shortage.

The KCFB Annual Meeting was discussed with a Thursday, June 8 date set. Selection of a Nominating Committee for election of 5 Directors in 2023 for 3year terms was also discussed. A slate of Nominating Committee members will be proposed at the December meeting. Directors with terms expiring in 2023 are Donna Lehrer, Karl Kettelkamp, Chris Collins, Craig Bradley & Joe Engel.

Directors approved a proposed Holiday schedule of 10 holidays for Kane County Farm Bureau for 2023.

Farm Bureau manager Steve Arnold provided updates on an IFB farm safety grant application, a winter "Rules for the Road" meeting and member recruitment goals for 2023. He reminded Directors of order deadlines for fresh HoKa

turkeys for Thanksgiving and holiday citrus for Christmas. Arnold also thanked Directors: Dale Pitstick – providing a location for a campaign photo shoot; Beth Gehrke & Craig Bradley - attending a Senator DeWitte F.O.A. presentation; Andy Lenkaitis – IFB Partners winter feature on livestock care; Jerry Gaitsch – making contacts on cell tower issues; Bill Collins – selling the winning VTR raffle ticket; Donna Lehrer - arranging for local farm themed baskets for IAA Silent Auction; and, Jim O'Connell – loaning a trailer to pick up 2023 VTR raffle prize.

In local issues, Directors reported on the October meeting of the Kane County Board Agriculture Committee, the Kane County Board and the Forest Preserve District.

Correspondence from Farm Bureau members was circulated to the Board including a Thank You from former IFB President John White Jr. for the October 13 recognition of his service and dedication of a tree in his honor on the KCFB front lawn. The meeting was adjourned at 9:04 PM. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the board of directors will be Thursday, December 8 at 7:00 PM.

KCFB to host 'Rules for the Road' Trucking seminar for farmers in NE IL planned for March

Illinois Farm Bureau will host a series of two-hour trucking seminars focusing on transportation laws and regulations as they pertain to the agricultural industry. One is planned for

mid-March at a yet to be announced location in Kane County.

"There are some trucking laws that have been reshaped in recent years, such as the Entry Driver Training Requirement that went into effect in 2022," said Rodney Knittel, IFB assistant director of transportation and infrastructure. "These presentations are designed to take a closer look at

these latest rules and provide an

opportunity for farmers to ask those ag-related trucking questions that they can't seem to find clear answers for."

The Rules for the Road Seminar will cover recent changes and some of the more established but still misunderstood rules, such as the USDOT Number, UCR registrations and driver's license classifications, to name a few. In addition, one of the meetings from a central Illinois location will also be broadcasted virtually.

Knittel specializes transportation issues and will lead the seminar series, and he will be joined by Illinois enforcement agencies.

Rules for the Road seminars are open to all Illinois Farm Bureau members. Attendance is free, courtesy of your County Farm Bureau and Illinois Farm Bureau, but advance registration will be requested.

Up to 20 scholarships to help local student study agriculture Applications available for KCFB FOUNDATION scholarships

The Kane County Farm Bureau FOUNDATION is pleased to announce that scholarships are available to members or dependents of members who wish to pursue higher education for a career in an agriculture related field. The applications are for the 2023-24 school year.

College students and high school seniors are invited to apply for these Kane County Farm Bureau FOUNDATION scholarships. Go to www. kanecfb.com and click on "Scholarships & Internships" to obtain a QR code or download an application, or, pick one up at the KCFB office, Randall Rd and Oak Street in St. Charles. A brochure is also available online to assist students in identifying potential careers and areas of ag-related study.

Farm Bureau internships are also available for the 2022 winter, and 2023 spring and summer breaks. A separate Internship application is available on the website. The KCFB FOUNDATION provided 15 scholarships last year and since 1989 has awarded over \$500,000 in tuition assistance to local college students.

Rodholm Charitable Trust Veterinary Scholarship, up to \$2,000, for an Illinois resident and student accepted to or enrolled in a School of Veterinary Medicine in the state of Illinois. The scholarship seeks to help develop the next generation of animal care practitioners.

President's Scholarship (1) \$1,500, reserved for the most outstanding application for a KCFB Foundation General Agricultural Scholarship from among high school seniors, will provide a minimum \$1,500 to be applied towards tuition.

General Agricultural Scholarships (up to 10 available) @ \$1,000 (minimum), for a KCFB member or dependent in good standing since February 1, two years prior to application deadline. Student must be pursuing higher education for an agriculture related career. A brochure is available to assist students in identifying those careers and areas of study.

John Buck Memorial Scholarships (2) @ \$1,500, through an endowment to the Foundation and supplemented by an annual John Buck Memorial Open golf outing, the fund provides for two (2) \$1,500 scholarships for higher education for agriculture students. Students in Kane, DeKalb, McHenry, Boone, Lake, DuPage or Will County are eligible to apply.

Buck was the founder of Buck Brothers, Inc. and J.W.

Turf, both of Hampshire, dealers and distributors of John Deere farm equipment and golf course maintenance equipment, respectively. The family & friends of John Buck established the John Buck Memorial Scholarship for agriculture students through the Kane County Farm Bureau Foundation.

Chuck Swanson Memorial Scholarship (1) @ \$1,000 (minimum), established by the family and friends of the former Farm Bureau Director and long-time volunteer to provide an annual award for a student residing in Kane County pursuing a degree in an agriculture-related career field.

AGCO Global Women's Network (AGWN) Scholarships (2) @ \$1,000, for women residing in Illinois, pursuing degrees in agriculture related career fields. AGCO GWN scholarships are supported by members of the local chapter at AGCO Parts in Batavia,

AGCO Parts Division Scholarships (2) @ \$1,000, for students residing in Illinois, pursuing degrees in agriculture related career fields. Local AGCO Parts division employees in Batavia raise funds to support this scholarship effort.

AGCO Platinum Scholarship (1) @ \$2,500, for an Illinois resident and currently enrolled college sophomore, junior or senior pursuing a degree in an agriculture related career field. Funds provided by special activities and projects carried out by our friends at AGCO Parts in Batavia.

General Scholarship (1) @

\$1,000, for a KCFB member or dependent in good standing since February 1, two years prior to application deadline, pursuing higher education for a career in ANY field.



For the family's love of homemade cinnamon rolls, I quietly step through the silence of our predawn home and into the kitchen to get rolling.

Still dark outside, I work from the glow of Christmas tree and the light of the kitchen island, where I had staged the final roll-making supplies the night before. I softly stream holiday music and savor the early morning peace, interrupted only by the tick of a warming stove and gentle blow from the furnace vents. That moment continues a home-baked holiday tradition at least three generations old, taught by my mother and grandmother before me. Now, my daughter often joins me.

Two hours later, the fragrance of baked cinnamon rolls fills the house, something like the loving aroma of a Thanksgiving meal. The household stirs, ready for the sweet, warm richness we enjoy around the holidays. When age 4, our son provided the only objection that I can recall. Mind you, I had sacrificed sleep to make the family-recipe rolls when he awoke and asked for pancakes. I managed to laugh at his innocent, insulting request. Now 10 years later, the cinnamon rolls have won him over.

mon roll dough rising in every warm spot of the house. I recall the rhythm of Mom rolling the dough at the counter and the way she uni-

formly sprinkled brown sugar and cinnamon across the dough, free from the over-applied globs I struggled with as a newbie. The timing at which to frost them seals the deal ó slightly melted to a transparent sheen to reveal the cinnamon-brown sugar swirl, but thick enough to sit atop a warm roll.

Dozens upon dozens of foil pans full of fresh cinnamon rolls left the farmhouse in which I grew up. Mom topped them with a bow for neighbors, landlords and relatives. I preferred mine at the dining room table with a glass of store-bought chocolate milk, which she purchased only around the holidays. I would slowly unwind the roll, eating it from tail to core every morning when they were available. I've eaten far more cinnamon rolls than my age for this annual tradition.

While much about the farm has changed with time and technology, we remain rooted in our favorite traditions. Nothing warms the soul quite like the homemade instructions that fill my recipe books. Even if it's pancakes.





The cooler ground temperatures of the bare and mulched areas stand in contrast to the turf grasses and parking lot, and even the river shaped walking paths in the garden. This aerial photo also captures a sense of the scale of the garden with the 7,200 square foot KCFB office building and its parking lot with cars in the background.


