

KCFB November 2023 Foundation board report

To keep Farm Bureau members informed of the activities, discussions and actions of the organization, the report below is provided when space and time permits in the Kane County Farmer. While not official minutes of the meeting(s), these reports are intended to keep members up to date on programs and issues of interest to members and the organization. The KCFB Foundation was formed in 1989 by the Farm Bureau to carry out educational and charitable programs for the benefit of agriculture and farm families. This 501c3 organization is controlled by a Board of eight Farm Bureau leaders, appointed annually.

The success of the KCFB Foundation's 11 2023 Drive-Thru BBQ's, its Vintage Truck Raffle and its September Farms & Food Gala allowed the Foundation Board to increase 2024-25 offerings to 21 scholarships valued at \$38,000. The changes to the scholarship program for 2024 were approved at an October meeting of the 8 Directors of the KCFB Foundation. The most significant changes included increasing the value of the President's Scholarship for high-school seniors to \$5,000 from the previous \$1,750, and increasing the ten (10) KCFB Foundation Agricultural Scholarships to "up to \$2,000 each". Those scholarship were awarded at \$1,250 each in 2023.

The returns from those fundraisers also allowed the organization to increase its funding for Agricultural Literacy, Continuing Education, Leadership Development and FFA Chapter support by \$6,500 for the coming year, while also setting aside money to fund scholarships for trade and technical school education for those seeking skills to serve in agricultural service and support roles.

At their October meeting Foundation Directors reviewed the results of all fundraisers conducted by the Foundation in 2023, including April's Touch-A-Tractor event, 11 drive-thru BBQ's in cooperation with Fay's BBQ, the Vintage Truck Raffle, Fall Harvest Sales and a September 17 Farms & Food Gala. They also approved continuation of a third-party contract to allow scholarship applicants to apply for 2024-25 scholarships online using a QR code. Those applications and the QR code will be released publicly by December 1 (and appear in this month issue of the Kane County Farmer).

Gala co-chairs Beth Gehrke and Bonnie White presented a de-brief of the September 17 event for the Board. It was the Foundation's largest and most successful fundraiser to-date, with over 250 attendees/supporters present, 65 sponsors and 68 prize donors for silent and live auctions. The Board authorized formation of a Gala Committee

for 2024 to plan a second event to support its scholarship, agricultural literacy and leadership development program.

In other Foundation action, April 12-14, 2024 were selected as the dates for the annual Touch-A-Tractor farm/city open house on the Kane County Farm Bureau lawn. The activity is again expected to be complimented by a Legislative Meet & Greet for local public officials and Farm Bureau leaders.

Directors also approved a July 9 date and the Kane County Cougars stadium as the venue 2024 Scholarship for Recognition and Donor Appreciation event, discussed changes to the annual budget to allow for contributions and donations to local agriculture related causes and events and approved a budget for the acquisition of a vintage pick-up truck for a 2024 Vintage Truck Raffle fundraiser.

The final item of business was consideration of changes in the Foundation's bylaws as drafted by the Illinois Farm Bureau's Office of General Counsel. The changes were proposed following a retreat for the Board in July where expanding the Board's governance structure was introduced. A resolution to effect the changes proposed will be acted upon at the next meeting of the Board.

To obtain a petition, you must provide proof of residency or ownership of land located

within the boundaries of the District. Petitions must be signed by a minimum of 25 persons who are of voting age and who reside or own land within the boundaries of the Kane DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District.

Completed petitions must be returned to the District's office no later than 4:30 pm on January 15, 2024.



You may not associate agriculture as having strong ties to Christmas, but many Illinois farmers provide one of the most popular Christmas items your family probably loves – Christmas trees!

A holiday tradition for many, Christmas trees include different species of firs, spruces, and pines, all of which stay green year-round. These trees are grown and harvested in 45 different states. Across the country, over 300,000 acres are dedicated to growing a traditional holiday sight, the Christmas tree. Ninety-eight percent of Christmas trees are grown on farms, and unlike artificial trees made from plastics, real Christmas trees can be recycled to provide benefits to the environment.

A Christmas tree can take up to 15 years to grow to 6 feet tall, so for each tree harvested, Christmas tree farmers plant one to three more seedlings for each tree harvested. While it may seem like these trees grow in the perfect Christmas tree shape, it probably required shearing and/or trimming during their growth to look that way.

So, while your family is picking out that perfect tree this year, remember to thank the farmers that planted and cared for it so you can bring a fresh-cut tree home to decorate.



Biofuels, renewable energy policies on deck for delegates

Illinois Farm Bureau's policy book may feature expanded positions on biofuels and renewable energy, after the Resolutions Committee on Nov. 8 advanced a set of proposals for final consideration at Annual Meeting.

Topping the list of submittals approved by both the Natural Resources Subcommittee and full Resolutions Committee is a trio of policies that would establish support for elements around sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) and other biofuels made from agricultural feedstocks.

Specifically, a submittal from

LaSalle County Farm Bureau would support using the Greenhouse Gasses, Regulated Emissions and Energy Use in Transportation (GREET) model for scoring the carbon intensity of biofuels made from inputs like soybean oil or corn grade ethanol.

Developed by the U.S. Department of Energy and the Argonne National Laboratory, the GREET model is the aviation and biofuel industries' favored model for lifecycle greenhouse gas calculations of transportation fuel like SAF.

Ag groups and most farmstate lawmakers in Congress also support the U.S. Treasury Department using the model when awarding tax credits for SAF, for instance, because it utilizes updated data around land use and accounts for conservation practices used by farmers.

"The GREET model for carbon scoring in the biofuels area seems to represent agriculture the best. It takes into account some things that some of the other models don't, so we think it's the most accurate for agriculture," said David Isermann, chair of the Natural Resources Subcommittee and LaSalle County Farm Bureau president.

Kane Co. Forest Preserve District to reintroduce bison to forest preserve

The American bison was nearly extinct in the 19th century. Thanks to conservation efforts, bison are no longer an endangered species. The Forest Preserve District of Kane County is planning for the reintroduction of a small bison herd in Burlington Prairie Forest Preserve in 2024.

Before Kane County was developed, Indigenous Peoples of America, fire and grazing habits of wild animals, such as bison, provided critical grassland management. Many years ago, KCFPD reintroduced a key element - controlled burns - to the preserves. Now they play to reintroduce bison to Burlington Prairie Forest Preserve In honor of National Bison Day

The district is planning for construction of a six-foot electric fence for the 60-acre enclosure, which will safely hold a small herd of roughly 15 animals. Construction is slotted to begin in 2024. In addition, a portion of proceeds from the 2023 Native Plant Sale, hosted by the Kane Forest Preserve Foundation, helped to secure a spotting scope that will provide excellent viewing opportunities! Big thanks to everyone who supported the sale!

In 1921, Dodge teamed with Graham Brothers Company in Indiana to manufacture 1.5 ton trucks with mechanical parts from Dodge and body parts from Graham Brothers.

1947 Dodge pickup truck. It's a

handsome beast, 76 years old

The trucks were sold through Dodge Brothers dealerships. In 1928, Dodge sold to the newly formed Chrysler Corporation, and that gave Dodge the advantage of fitting their vehicles with engines developed by DeSoto, Chrysler and Plymouth. This, paired with the introduction of the 6-cylinder engine, gave pickup trucks more power, more prestige, and more cachet with the public.

Dodge pickup truck production progressed through the 1930s with a brand new pickup dedicated production facility in Warren, MI, a line of dedicated pickup truck chassis and the introduction of a new style line that was inspired by the popular Art Deco arts movement.



During the 1930s, Dodge also produced some specialty vehicles for the U.S. government for military use, including an experimental 4-wheel drive truck. That niche military mar-



ket came to prominence after December 7th, 1941 and on January 1, 1942, when the United States Office of Production Management ordered a complete stop to the manufacturing of all automotive parts and automobiles unless given special permission by local authorities. All American auto manufacturers ceased production and "retooled" for the production of military vehicles.

Dodge became the U.S. Army's main supplier of halfton trucks and the sole supplier 1945. After the war ended in 1945, Dodge promptly converted back to civilian vehicle products, and in 1046, produced its five mil

of 3/4-ton and 1-1/2 ton trucks

during WWII. Over 250,000

units were built through August

to civilian vehicle products, and in 1946, produced its five millionth vehicle. They continued the pickup truck style line that had been introduced in 1939, with sleek horizontal lines, smooth curved fenders and an Art Deco grille. That year, our Vintage Truck rolled off the production line in Warren, MI, and began its 76 year journey to Kane County Farm Bureau to become the star of our 2024 Vintage Truck Raffle.

1947 was the last year for the Art Deco styling, in 1948 Dodge introduced its B-Series truck with styling more in keeping with the approaching 1950s. Our Vintage Truck may look downright petite next to its modern Ram counterparts, but it has a fascinating lineage and holds its own proud spot in history.

It's currently parked at our KCFB entrance, serenely surveying the bustle of holiday shoppers. Bustle on by, visit the truck, Marks Tree Farm and our Kane County Farm Bureau Country Store. General Assembly passes measure to protect landowners

By Erin M. Henkel, FarmWeek During fall veto session, the Illinois General Assembly passed a measure brought by Illinois Farm Bureau requiring wind and solar developers to plan for and repair agricultural damages, including subsurface issues, a legislative priority for the IFB Board.

Senate Bill 1699, sponsored by state Sen. Bill Cunningham, D-Chicago, and Rep. Larry Walsh, D-Elwood, passed unanimously in both chambers on a vote of 107-0 in the House and 51-0 in the Senate and will be sent to Gov. J.B. Pritzker for final approval.

According to Walsh, the bill addresses concerns about a law passed in January preventing county ordinances from restricting wind and solar development, but the law did not include provisions for drainage and Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreements (AIMA).

Cunningham said the new bill responds to concerns over previous damage done to tile drainage by wind and solar projects and ensures renewable energy companies would be liable to repair any agricultural damages.

"About a year ago, the Senate passed a new law regarding renewable energy projects and at the time of that bill's passage the (Illinois) Farm Bureau pointed to some concerns regarding specifically, a potential damage that could be done

to property when renewable projects are installed," Cunningham told FarmWeek.

IFB Director of State Legislation Chris Davis said if the measure is signed by the governor, it will require wind and solar projects to file a farmland drainage plan with the county and impacted drainage districts, outlining what the facility will do to repair any subsurface or surface damage as soon as reasonably practicable.

"It also adds a layer of accountability for the renewable companies that these hearings are held," Cunningham said referencing county board approval. "Laws can be embedded right into the zoning code that ensures that the renewable companies live up to their end of the agreement."

The measure also clarifies a vegetative ground cover and vegetative management plan shall follow provisions outlined in the AIMA, which is supported by IFB policy, unless the landowner negotiates a more stringent standard in agreement with the developer.

"If a developer comes in and wants to put 180-acre solar farm on somebody's property, they have to go and they have to do a drainage study, they have to put that drainage plan in," Walsh said. "They have to submit that to the county."

Walsh said that despite challenges to pass the legislation, there was a commitment to work with IFB to protect landowners and agriculture.

"This was negotiated with the

Farm Bureau and the other parties involved, this was agreed-to language. If there's other issues we need to address in the future, I am sure they'll be brought to our attention and we'll address them," he said.

"It is a good first step to put those protections and make sure our ag mitigation that we adopted years ago for pipelines and utilities are enforceable within this new industry as it continues to grow."
