# Carlsons fund new KCFB FOUNDATION scholarship

The Kane County Farm Bureau FOUNDATION is pleased to announce the addition of a new scholarship for 2019, funded by former KCFB Director Frank Carlson and his wife Ruth, of St. Charles. The Ruth & Frank Carlson Scholarship will provide a \$1,500 college award for a student studying at Waubonsee Community College, Elgin Community College or ANY college or University in the state of Minnesota.

Carlson, who hailed originally from a dairy farm in Minnesota, served on the KCFB Board of Directors from 2008-2018. He left the farm for college at 18 and followed a career path that included jobs in retail, merchandising, copywriting, sales management, product buyer and real estate, as well as a stint in the military. Carlson describes his own 160 acre farm in East Central (Chisago County) Minnesota as "a place which strengthens your soul ... kind of like Garrison Keilor's Lake Wobegon."

He joined the Farm Bureau Board because he found pleasure in working with the farm community and "its wonderful people" he said. "They are at the heart of providing for the pleasant ebb and flow, the pace, the joys and the interesting events and personalities of rural life."

## **Board Meeting review – November**

The first guest on the November meeting agenda was Bob Effner, Elgin/St. Charles COUNTRY Financial Agency Manager who reported on company recruitment and product offerings and the devastation and claims activity caused by the recent hurricanes in the southeastern U.S. Mark Musial, Business Services Manager for Conserv FS reported on the action of the co-operative's Board to approve the payment of \$3 million in patronage refunds to Farm Bureau member patrons based on 2018 fiscal year purchases, paid as 70% cash and 30% Class E preferred stock. Musial reported that the Board also approved \$700,000 of stock revolvement.

In Unfinished Business, Directors reviewed invoices for building and grounds projects and reviewed the Illinois Farm Bureau Annual Meeting schedule. Weekend activities include a Discussion Meet where Carolyn Gehrke of Elgin will compete. Sunday's Auction fundraiser will include a quilt made by Bonnie White of Elburn and that evening's "Taste of Illinois" will feature food products from two local Farm Bureau members: Foxtrot Organic Farm of St. Charles and Garlic Breath Farm of Kaneville. Delegates begin discussion of Policy Resolutions on local, state and national issues Monday morning.

A progress report was given on the KCFB FOUNDATION's "31 Days of Christmas" fundraiser. Ticket sales end November 30. 10,000 Gallon milk CHALLENGE results were shared and Directors were reminded of existing matches, or "Challenges". Sample PR materials were circulated and the new URL for direct donations, www.kanegives.org/ 10000 was revealed.

In New Business, details for the Victory Mixer for elected officials were shared and attendance confirmed. KCFB's 2019 holiday schedule was approved as presented. April 11, 2019 was set as the date for the organization's Annual Meeting and names were discussed for the Nominating Committee and alternates.

President Joe White's reported on the October 22 farm tour for Ingredion employees. He thanked director Craig Bradley for attending and answering questions about bee keeping and collecting honey.

A volunteer schedule was created for citrus distribution on December 12, and new/beginning farmer education and farm business topics for 2019 were discussed. Manager Steve Arnold also reported on the most recent donation of vintage and collectible farm toys to the KCFB FOUNDATION from Rodney Oxe, formerly of Batavia.

Bill Collins presented the Membership/PR report including contributions for the FOUN-DATION from Thomas Richter, Wayne; Jim & Deloris O'Connell, Elburn; Mendel Plumbing & Heating, St. Charles; Buck Bros, Inc., Hampshire (for John Buck Memorial Scholarships); and

Glen & Louise Johnson, St. Charles (Harvest for ALL, Northern Illinois Food Bank). Donors for the 10,000 Gallon milk Challenge included Mike & Carol Kenyon, South Elgin; Beth & Bob Gehrke, Elgin; Dick & Carol Gerhardt, Hampshire; Kathy & Tsuneo Konishi, Carpentersville; AGCO employees and AGCO Global Women's Network, Batavia.

A written report on Ag-inthe-Classroom activities was circulated from Ag Literacy Coordinator, Suzi Myers. The Illinois Farm Bureau has combined the functions of Ag-inthe-Classroom and the Illinois Farm Families program into a new entity, the Illinois Center for Agricultural Engagement.

The Government Affairs report included a recent Congressional "Action Request" on the Farm Bill and a response to the request from Senator Tammy Duckworth.

Miscellaneous reports were given on Farm Safety Treat distribution; an October 17 Farm Safety Day in Big Rock; the October 29th AGCO Health/ Wellness Fair; and ACTIVATOR "Friend of Agriculture" award presentations to Congressman Roskam, Senators Castro, Holmes, and Oberweis; Representatives Kifowit, Chapa-LaVia, Moeller, and Wheeler. Arnold also shared results of the October Harvest Décor fundraiser for the KCFB FOUNDATION.

Local Government Reports included County Board, Forest Preserve District and Kane County Agriculture Committee activities and a Stormwater Ordinance update. The Kane County Stormwater Technical Advisory Committee has received a 45 Day Review of a Draft of Kane County Stormwater Ordinance revisions. It was provided for the Board. There were no reports from the Farmland Protection Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, or Regional Planning Committee.

Other correspondence included the receipt of checks from: AGCO for the 10,000 Gallon milk Challenge; Buck Bros. Inc. - for the John Buck Memorial Scholarship fund; IAA Foundation – for the KCFB Ag Literacy program; and Ruth & Frank Carlson - for a newly sponsored Ruth & Frank Carlson Scholarship.

The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Thursday, December 13th at 7 pm.

# **Conserv FS declares patronage**

For the tenth consecutive year, the Conserv FS Board of Directors has declared near record levels of patronage refunds. Consistent with last year's payout, patronage of \$3 million will be paid out for 2018 fiscal year purchases. And again this year's patronage payout will be paid as 70% cash and 30% Class E preferred stock.

The company's performance in fiscal 2018 was strong, along with its balance sheet, which allows the company to pay such a high cash percentage.

"The diversification of our coop has allowed us to manage through tough years in one area while generating strong profits in others" says John Tuttle, Conserv FS General Manager.

Individual rates of payout are determined by product line and will be similar to last year's rates.

Individual checks will be processed and cut over the next

few weeks and will be distributed in mid- December. A full breakdown of payments rates will be included with the check and member's individual payment record. Rates may vary for direct transport load deliveries.

In addition to patronage, the board approved \$700,000 of stock revolvement, keeping the cooperative on a ten year cycle, a primary goal of the board. "Keeping the stock of the coop in the hands of active patrons is something we pride ourselves on as a board" said John Henning, board president. With the cash patronage and stock revolvement, the company will return nearly \$2.8 million in cash to the country.

Conserv FS, Inc. is a Federated Cooperative locally owned and controlled, based in Woodstock, Illinois. Conserv proudly serves patrons throughout Northeastern Illinois and Southeastern Wisconsin.

## 20+ scholarships to help local students study agriculture Applications available for KCFB FOUNDATION scholarships

he Kane County Farm ■ Bureau FOUNDATION is pleased to announce that over 20 scholarships are available to members or dependents of members who wish to pursue higher education for a career in an agriculture related field. The applications are for the 2019-20 school year.

College students and high school seniors are invited to apply for these Kane County Farm Bureau FOUNDATION scholarships. Go to www.kane cfb.com and click on "Scholarships & Internships" to download an application, or, pick one up at the KCFB office, Randall Rd. and Oak Street in St. Charles. A brochure is also available online to assist students in identifying potential careers and areas of ag-related study.

Farm Bureau internships are also available for the 2018 winter, and 2019 spring and summer breaks. A separate Internship application is available on the website. The KCFB FOUNDA-TION provided 16 scholarships last year and since 1989 has awarded over \$500,000 in tuition assistance to local college students.

#### **General Agricultural** Scholarships (up to 10)

To be eligible for a Kane County Farm Bureau general scholarship, the member or dependent must have been a member in good standing for two years. The student must also

The KCFB Foundation awarded 24 scholarships last year to area students, including Andrew Gould of Elburn who was awarded the President's Scholarship for study at the University of Illinois. Applications for the 2019-20 school year are now available and are due Feb. 15.

#### **FOUNDATION President's** Scholarship (1)

The President's Scholarship is reserved for the high school senior among Foundation scholarship applicants possessing the most outstanding combination of scholastics, activities, goals and ACT score. The President's Award Scholarship will provide a minimum \$1,500 to be applied towards tuition.

#### John Buck Memorial Scholarships (2)

An endowment to the Foundation, supplemented by an annual John Buck Memorial Open golf outing, provides funds for two (2) \$1,500 scholarships for higher education for agriculture students. Any student in Kane, DeKalb, McHenry, Boone, Lake, DuPage or Will County is eligible to apply. A similar scholarship program has been established by the family through the Midwest Golf Course Superintendent's Association. Buck was the founder of Buck Brothers. Inc. and J.W. Turf, both of Hampshire, dealers and distributors of John Deere farm equipment and golf course maintenance equipment, respectively. Late in 2001, the family of John Buck established the John Buck Memorial Scholarship for agriculture students through the Kane County Farm Bureau Foundation.

#### **Chuck Swanson Memorial** Scholarship (1)

The Chuck Swanson Memorial Scholarship was established by the family and friends of the former Farm Bureau Director and long-time volunteer to provide an annual award for a student residing in Kane County pursuing a degree in an agriculture-related career field.

#### **AGCO Global Women's Network** (AGWN) Scholarships (2)

Provides two (2) \$1000 college scholarships annually to a woman pursuing a degree in agricultural related career field that resides in the state of Illinois. AGCOGWN scholarships are supported by members of the local chapter at AGCO Parts in Batavia,

#### **AGCO Parts Division** Scholarships (2)

Provides two (2) \$1000 college scholarship annually to a student pursuing a degree in agricultural related career field that resides in the state of Illinois. Local AGCO Parts division employees in Batavia raise funds to support this scholarship effort. AGCO Platinum Scholarship (1)

A \$2,500 college scholarship for a currently enrolled college sophomore, junior or senior applicant pursuing a degree in agricultural related career field that resides in the state of Illinois. Funds provided by special activities and projects carried out by our friends at AGCO Parts in Batavia.

When innovative agricultural companies and organizations visit local farms, not only is knowledge shared and gained, but bridges are built and bonds are made between businesses that are independent – but dependent of each other. That is the purpose behind farm tours arranged by Illinois Farm Bureau's Director of External Relations, Ryan Tracy. In the past year, Tracy has called on three Kane County farmers to host employees from McDonald's, U.S. EPA Region 5,

Ingredion employees, IFB staff members Ryan Tracy and Lauren Lurkins, KCFB staff, and the White family gathered in the farm shop on the crisp, sunny October morning. There Joe White shared his family and

and most recently, Ingredion. changes and progress modern farming has taken on. When asked what his typical yield for corn is, he answered "We used to get 130 bushel back when I started, but just last year we had a record crop, which produced 211 bushel/acre."

Ingredion employees learned about progress in farming and the technology that farmers now use, which increases yield and productivity. Auto-steer has paved the way for farmers to focus on the other aspects of planting, rather than where they are driving and trying to keep the rows straight. Auto-steer helps save on fuel and anhydrous ammonia application, a total nearing 15% on average. The Whites put together a "Price the Part" contest for parts and technology they had replaced on tractors, combines and tillage equipment this year. Joe also reviewed a 40 year

progression of monitors for seed, fertilizers and crop protectants, a visible indicator to the Ingredion group of changes in technology.

Besides technology, seed breeding and technology to increase resistance to drought, insects, diseases and herbicides resistance into seeds has contributed to the dramatic increase in yield. The cost of seeds has mirrored the desired characteristics, increasing substantially. A bag of corn, which holds approximately 80,000 kernels, used to be \$30/bag. Prices now range from \$200/bag to \$400/bag. Joe recalls when bags of seed corn first broke \$100/bag - back in 1991. "You don't just spill corn now! Think of throwing a handful of nickels out, that's what it feels like when you spill any of the seed kernels," he exclaimed. With 32,000 - 36,000 kernels needed to plant each acre, it comes down to each kernel being counted and accounted for.

Many questions were raised by the employee group. Topics ranged from GMO's and organics, what diseases impact corn and the effects, and crop rotation. Each question was thoughtfully answered by White and the group was genuinely interested in each and every topic covered during the discussion. Following the discussion and a catered lunch, Ingredion employees we given the opportunity to ride in the combine (neighbor Jim O'Connell was kind enough to leave about 30 rows of corn standing for the group to experience harvest), tractors performing tillage operations, or the tractor pulling the grain cart. The White also opened the machine shed for the group to see planters, a grain drill and even a 1960's era one row corn picker.





# Farm Facts @ Fun



## Did you know?

Eggnog is technically stirred custard – a mixture of dairy and eggs. Traditionally, posset was used as a cold and flu remedy. (moms used to make it for kids when they had the flu)

It's been around since the 16th Century. Eggnog's origins can be traced back to sack posset, an Elizabethan-era drink made with spices, milk, eggs and fortified wine like Madeira. It was served thick, hot and somewhat chunky (the milk was curdled by the hot spiced wine).

It's named after a mug. The word nog comes from noggin, which is a small wooden mug typically used to drink ale.

If caused a riof. Christmas 1826 at the United States Military Academy in West Point, NY, was not a peaceful one. It started with a party, fueled by eggnog spiked with whiskey that cadets smuggled into the academy. It ended with broken windows, gunshots, one knockedout lieutenant and lots of damaged property. Twenty cadets were court-martialed, and the event was thereafter known as the Eggnog Riot. Bonus fact: Jefferson Davis, the future president of the Confederate States, was among the rioters.

George Washington served it. According to kitchen records from Mount Vernon, President George Washington used to serve an ultraboozy eggnog to guests. His version included whiskey, rye, rum and sherry

If cures sore throats. At least, an old Russian/Yiddish version of the drink purportedly does. Kogel mogel is made with egg yolks, sugar and rum. It's served hot and traditionally used as a home remedy for

The Eggnog Laffe has been around since 1986. Starbucks's Eggnog Latte didn't actually start at Starbucks. It was first made in 1986 at II Giornale, a small Seattle coffee chain owned by Howard Schultz. He bought Starbucks in 1987, rebranded his stores and kept the Eggnog Latte tradition.

Tom and Jerry drink made with egg nog was a favorite of President Warren G. Harding, who served it at an annual Christmas party for his closest friends

## Easy, pleasing eggnog recipes

#### Kid-Friendly Microwave Eggnog

By Lucy Mathieson Our kid-friendly eggnog takes only minutes to make and tastes great! Serves 2, prep: 0:05, cook 0:05.

#### Ingredients:

- 3 tbsp. caster sugar (can use honey, maple syrup or regular sugar)
- 3 tsp vanilla extract
- 2 eggs
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup whole milk
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon (to sprinkle)
- 1 tsp ground nutmeg (to sprinkle)

#### Method:

- 1. Place eggs, caster sugar and vanilla into a medium bowl
  - 2. Whisk together well
- 3. Add milk and cream and whisk together until completely combined.
- 4. Pour the eggnog into two microwave-safe mugs
- 5. Heat in 30 second bursts for 4-6 minutes. At the end of each 30 seconds, whisk the eggnog with a fork. It is ready when hot, but don't allow to boil.
  - 6. Serve warm or chilled with

a sprinkle of cinnamon or nutmeg.

#### overnight cranberry-Eggnog Coffee Cake

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 25 min. + chilling Bake: 35 min. + cooling YIELD: 15 servings.

#### Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 large eggs 1 cup eggnog
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 21/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon grated orange zest
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries

#### STREUSEL:

2/3 cup sugar

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons butter, softened 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 cup chopped pecans

#### **GLAZE:**

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar 1 tablespoon eggnog

#### Directions:

1. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until blended. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. In a small bowl, whisk eggnog, sour cream and vanilla. In another bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, orange zest, baking soda and salt; add to the creamed mixture alternately with eggnog mixture, beating well after each addition. Stir in cranberries.

- 2. Transfer to a greased 13x9-in. baking pan. For streusel, in a small bowl, mix sugar, flour, butter and cinnamon until blended. Stir in pecans; sprinkle over batter. Refrigerate, covered, at least 8 hours or overnight.
- 3. Preheat oven to  $350\infty$ . Remove pan from refrigerator while oven heats. Bake 35-40 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack 20 minutes.
- 4. For glaze, in a small bowl, mix confectioners' sugar and eggnog until smooth; drizzle over cake. Serve warm.

## 2019 CDL Random Drug/Alcohol Testing Pool set to beg

Kane County Farm Bureau is renewing the Random Drug/ Alcohol Testing Pool for individuals or businesses with Commercial Driver's Licenses to comply with Federal Highway Department Transportation regulations.

If you have a commercial driver's license, you are under Federal Highway

Department of Transportation regulations for drug and alcohol testing. Owner/operators and small companies with drivers must join an existing consortium for the random testing. Farmer and certain family members have been exempted in certain instances.

Each person who has a CDL will be required to pay a

\$125.00 or \$145.00 for on-farm testing consortium fee for fixed or location testing to be included in the pool. We also require each person in the pool be a member of the Farm Bureau. (Farmer memberships are \$37.00/year and Associate Memberships are \$20.00/year). The program will run from Jan. 1, 2019 – Dec. 31, 2019.

The consortium fee covers the setup fee and random drug and/or alcohol tests during the year no matter how often your name is drawn. We will also provide one free supervisor training manual. If your name is not pulled, you will not receive a refund on pool money. A special feature of the Kane County Farm Bureau pool is a mobile unit that provides on-site testing. This mobile unit, with certified testing equipment and specialists, will add convenience and time saving elements to the overall program.

Foley Carrier Services, the management company that we have contracted to provide consortium services, provides other services in relation to the regulations. However, the consortium fee does not cover any of the non-random expenses.

To participate in the 2019 consortium, complete the enrollment application and mail a check for \$125.00 or \$145.00 payable to the Kane County Farm Bureau by Dec. 28, 2018. Please renew your Farm Bureau membership if you have not done so. We must have your renewal payment as soon as possible to continue the random selection process.
