## KCFB awarded at Dec. IFB Annual Meeting

Illinois Farm Bureau's 2023 annual meeting was held December 2-5 in Chicago. The weekend yielded new policy submittals and resolutions, and a lot of socializing and idea exchanges for representatives from all of Illinois' 102 counties.

Kane County Farm Bureau was there and was recognized for leadership and innovation in three program areas: Advocacy, Ag Literacy and the New Horizon Award for innovation in programming.

The Advocacy Award recognizes county effectiveness and visibility as an advocate for farmers, legislative and regulatory

activities, Friend of Farm Bureau recognition, legislative visits, FB Act and policy development.

Ag Literacy Awards are given for projects and programs related to educating students and teachers about the source of food and fiber and the role agriculture plays in our economy and society including ag career exploration, teacher workshops, and other innovative programs.

The IFB New Horizon Award recognizes new and innovative programs that follow the priorities set by the Illinois Farm Bureau Board of Directors and/or county Farm Bureau goals/priorities.

# State Rep. Keicher wants new approach to prevent roadside trash

SYCAMORE – State Rep. Jeff Keicher, R-Sycamore, is working with officials in the 70th Illinois House District to increase enforcement and develop new policy proposals to prevent roadside trash from waste-hauling trucks, according to a news release.

The trash has raised community safety and environmental concerns after causing damage to farmers' fields and operations, according to the release.

"For years, I've been frustrated with the trash that's been windblown from waste haulers going from transfer stations to landfills through our communities," Keicher said. "Besides the litter problem, trash blowing off waste trucks is a safety hazard, and it is damaging local farmers' fields and equipment.

"Current law places nominal fines on the truck driver, but we need a new approach that incentivizes waste-hauling companies to transport trash more securely and support communities when cleanup is needed."

Keicher's district includes parts of DeKalb, Kane and

McHenry counties.

The current law gives nominal fines to waste-hauling truck drivers for trash blown off the trucks. The truck's company does not receive a fine.

"Trash blowing from garbage haulers is a major problem, particularly for our farmers," said DeKalb County Sheriff Andy Sullivan, whose department has stepped up enforcement efforts.

"Not only are farmers forced to invest extra time and resources to clean up the debris, but the debris, particularly plastics, is damaging their equipment. While our increased enforcement of current law has helped, it's going to require a change in policy to get this problem under control, and we appreciate the work of Rep. Keicher to help us solve this problem and reduce

the harm it's causing."

Kane County Farm Bureau Vice President Dale Pitstick, who is a farmer, shared similar concerns.

"On a daily basis, I see trash fly off waste trucks as they pass by my fields. It's very disheartening to see the litter covering the landscape," Pitstick said. "The trash is getting into our water supply, which is obviously concerning, and many of us have had to till our fields again in the fall to prevent damage to our equipment. The current law simply isn't doing enough, but hopefully bringing some more awareness to the problem can help make a change."

Keicher's proposals include HB 2419, which would give municipalities the ability to require waste haulers to add a protective chute. The second proposal is HB 2420, which would create a local government grant program to fund roadside cleanup programs when haulers fail to secure their loads.

The fee also would be reduced or removed for fully enclosed haulers.

Keicher said he expects the policy solutions to move forward during the legislature's upcoming spring session.

Improving agricultural literacy involves more than elementary classrooms. It's a whole of K-12 education and a community outreach effort. # Private well testing program offered in Feb.

The Kane County Farm Bureau and Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District are cooperating again to offer a water-testing program in February 2024. A high quality water supply is vital for families, and this program helps provide peace of mind and identifies potential problem areas for homeowners of Kane County.

The program works simply as follows:  
**Step 1. Monday, February 26 – Friday, March 8, 2024**

Pick up water test kit(s) from the Kane County Farm Bureau, 8:30-5:00 p.m. or from the Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District, 8:00-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Payment is due for each test kit upon pickup.

**Step 2. Sunday, March 10**

Collect the water sample.  
**Step 3. Monday, March 11 only**  
 Return the water sample to the Farm Bureau or Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District.

Detailed sampling instruc-

tions are included in each well water test kit, and additional information on how the test can help you is provided at the Farm Bureau or the Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District offices. Test results are mailed directly to your home.



This month’s theme is all about Illinois History! Inside the chore bucket, K-5 teachers will find a classroom set of Illinois


room. They address the Illinois Learning Standards in math, science, English language arts and social studies.

Did you know that milk makes its way from the farm to the grocery store in under 48 hours? This is in large part thanks to dedicated truck drivers hauling milk across the state. This allows you to have the freshest milk you can in your refrigerator, and it may be more local than you think. If you want to know where your milk came from, check out the graphic below!

Transportation is a vital part of the agriculture industry. Without it, there would be gaps in the supply chain. From farm to processing to the grocery store, reliable transportation ensures that your family has access to the best products Illinois has to offer.

Milk travels from the farm to the grocery store in fewer than 48 hours. LOCATE YOUR CODE:

1. Codes are usually printed near the top of the container or on the lid but is sometimes found printed on the label.
2. The first part of the code will always be two numbers (between 01 and 56).
3. The second part of the code (after the first two numbers) can be one to five digits long, can contain numbers or letters, and may include a dash.
4. Add your product code to the website's dairy code search function to learn where your product was processed and packaged before being delivered to your local store. Commonly, dairy products are made with milk that is sourced within a short distance of the processing plant.

## Snack haulers—craft 'em & eat!

### Supplies

- 24 Rolo candies, unwrapped
- Frosting (white or in a color corresponding to your wafers)
- 12 wafer cookies
- 12 mini chocolate chips
- 36 mini pretzel sticks

### Instructions

Line four Rolo candies in a rectangle shape laying on their sides with the top of the Rolo facing outwards. Pipe a dot of frosting on tops of each Rolo tire.

Lay one wafer cookie on top of the frosting dots so that it rests on the Rolo tires like the bottom of a truck.

Cut two squares out of another wafer cookie that are the width of the wafer cookie truck bottom. Pipe a dot of frosting in the middle of the end ¼ of the wafer truck bottom. Place one of the squares on top of the icing dot so that about ¼ inch of the wafer cookie bottom is showing. Place another dot of frosting on the top of the wafer square and top it with the other wafer square that you cut.

Pipe two dots of frosting on the front of the truck where the headlight would be. Press

two mini chocolate chips into the frosting, flat bottoms facing outward.

Pipe a few lines of frosting in the center of the truck bed. Place three mini pretzel sticks on the frosting. Pipe two lines of frosting (one in between each pretzel) on top of the pretzels and place two pretzel sticks on top.

Pipe one more line of frosting in between the two pretzel sticks and place one more pretzel stick on top of that.

Cover with plastic wrap and let sit out overnight for the frosting to harden.

### Farms need licensed truckers

CDL? 10-4.

That three-letter acronym for Commercial Driver's License also stands for one of my biggest

life achievements. Until two years ago, I had no idea how to drive a stick shift. Not even in a car. But our family farm needed more truck drivers, and I wanted to contribute. I stood determined to drive a 10-speed-transmission semi and learn to double clutch while mindful of a 42-foot-long

trailer behind me.

Semis arrived on our farm about 30 years ago, a need driven by greater crop productivity, bigger farm equipment and the desire for efficiency. Today, we require people with this licensed skill in the spring to deliver seed and fertilizer to planters in the field, in the summer to get product to the sprayer, in the fall to move grain from field to storage, and another nine months of the year to haul grain to market.

Given my serious lack of experience, I must credit the patience of six men with licenses on the farm who encouraged and helped me earn a full-fledged CDL about 14 months ago. Poor Kent on the first day I attempted to learn straight-line backing, and poor Dale, who

witnessed me crawl a hill in first gear from a standstill while fully loaded.

With the help of YouTube and excessive amounts of practice with members of our farm team riding shotgun, I passed all the required tests: the three written exams, the detailed underhood inspection, the skills course, and the drive. Per test requirements, I parallel-parked the semi and grain trailer, successfully putting all 18 wheels inside the lines from the driver's side. (Just in case I ever need to parallel park on a one-way street.) I aced offset backing with no pull-ups on my second skills course attempt, and afterward drove the city streets and interstate without missing a gear. Whew.

Most importantly, I gained empathy and respect for our team and other men and women who have mastered the skill. I now drive my minivan differently, understanding the risks that drivers of passenger vehicles can create in their sudden stops, haphazard lane changes and merges without consideration. All drivers should take a written CDL exam, if nothing more than to learn the length a semi needs to stop. To that, I would expect a loud and clear 10-4.

Illinois Farm Bureau's Governmental Affairs Leadership Conference returns Feb. 15 as a one-day, in-person event to provide members with updates on issues ranging from the livestock industry and water quality to carbon markets and fertilizer prices.

This year's theme is "Shaping the Future." The event will be held at the Bank of Springfield Center, Springfield. The popular legislative reception will be at 6:15 p.m. at the President Abraham Lincoln Hotel.

"This is an opportunity not only for members to hear what IFB's legislative and regulatory

focus will be in 2024, but for them to be part of that process, learn from experts and staff and provide their input on what our approach should be," said Mark Gebhards, IFB executive director of governmental affairs and commodities.

Governmental Affairs & Commodities staff will lead three, 55-minute workshop sessions, while two guest speakers will each host one-hour talks.

Keynote speakers include Chris Stirewalt, an American politics editor for The Dispatch and a former Fox News digital politics editor, and Gregg Doud, who served as the chief agricultural negotiator in the Office of the United States Trade

Representative (USTR) during the Trump Administration.

Meanwhile, the first workshop session will focus on the Illinois General Assembly, livestock issues faced by the state, rules and tips about road safety and developments in conservation, climate change and carbon markets.

The second workshop session will feature strategies for communication, energy's impact on agriculture and ways county Farm Bureaus can partner with local government.

The third workshop session will cover updates from the IFB ACTIVATOR, programs and services aiding the livestock industry, the Adopt-a-Legislator

program, water policy and the American Rescue Plan Act.

An additional session will include a presentation about fertilizer and input prices from a panel of American Farm Bureau Federation staff.

"The event ends with the state legislative reception, which is a unique opportunity for our members to speak directly to their elected representatives and to tell their story. That's the power of Farm Bureau," Gebhards said.
