Ag at Lifelong Learning Institute @ WCC?

The Lifelong Learning Institute (LLI) adds a fulfilling dimension to the lives of many seniors in the area. Hosted by Waubensee Community College, LLI offers educational courses in a wide variety of subjects: art, history, music, literature, science, public policy and much more. The courses are led (facilitated) by LLI members who have a passion for a subject of their interest. The format for classes is informal and encourages discussion where members learn both from the facilitator but also from the wisdom and experience of the others. LLI courses are often enriched by an outside speaker who is able to illuminate the course topic with a particular expertise. Also, courses may be organized where a guest presenter will lead a complete course. The LLI also organizes trips to places of local interest. Classes typically meet once a week for two hours for up to six weeks. Courses are offered in the spring, summer, and fall. All seniors (50+) are welcome to LLI.


In normal times classes are held in local venues like public libraries and retirement homes, as well as on the Waubensee

Community College campus. Like other organizations during the COVID-19 crisis, LLI has adapted to virtual classes. Even as we move back to in-person classes it is likely, however, that a few virtual or hybrid classes will become the norm, to accommodate members who are less mobile.

Agriculture is part of the fabric of the community served by Lifelong Learners. LLI members have expressed interest in learning more about such issues as how farming will adapt to climate change, experience with sustainable agriculture, new methods that increase productivity and how global markets will evolve. LLI would like to learn from members of the Kane County Farm Bureau on these or other issues that are important to farmers in the area and, indeed, the world at large. 

USDA sets dates for conservation reserve program signups

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has set a July 23, 2021, deadline for agricultural producers and landowners to apply for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) General signup 56. Additionally, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will accept applications for CRP Grasslands from July 12 to August 20. This year, USDA updated both signup options to provide greater incentives for producers and increase its conservation benefits, including reducing the impacts of climate change.

Both signups are competitive and will provide for annual rental payments for land devoted to conservation purposes.

"Bottom line, CRP now makes more financial sense for producers while also providing a bigger return on investment in terms of natural resource benefits. The General and Grasslands signups are part of a broader suite of tools available through CRP to integrate key conservation practices on our nation's working lands."

General Signup

Through CRP, producers and landowners establish long-term, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality, and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland. Lands enrolled in

CRP also play a key role in mitigating impacts from climate change, and FSA has added a new Climate-Smart Practice Incentive for practices that sequester carbon and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

FSA is also adding a one-time "inflationary" adjustment for payment rates, as well as having more flexibility on adjusting soil rental rates.

FSA opened the General Signup in January 2021 and extended the original deadline to July 23, 2021, to enable producers to consider FSA's new improvements to the program.

Grasslands Signup

CRP Grasslands helps landowners and operators protect grassland, including rangeland, and pastureland and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as grazing lands. Protecting grasslands contributes positively to the economy of many regions, provides biodiversity of plant and animal populations, and improves environmental quality.

FSA has updated the Grasslands Signup to establish a minimum rental rate of \$15 per acre, as well as new National Grassland Priority Zones.

How to Sign Up

To enroll in the CRP General signup, producers and landowners should contact their local USDA Service Center by the

July 23 deadline. To enroll in the CRP Grasslands signup, they should contact USDA by the August 20 deadline. While USDA offices may have limited visitors because of the pandemic, Service Center staff continue to work with agricultural producers via phone, email, and other digital tools. To work with FSA, producers and landowners should contact their local USDA Service Center. Contact information can be found at farmers.gov/service-locator.

More Information on CRP

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest voluntary private-lands conservation programs in the United States. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. The program marked its 35-year anniversary this past December.

Under the Biden-Harris Administration, USDA is engaged in a whole-of-government effort to combat the climate crisis and conserve and protect our nation's lands, biodiversity, and natural resources, including our soil, air and water. Through conservation practices, USDA aims to enhance economic growth and create new

streams of income for farmers, ranchers, producers and private foresters. Successfully meeting these challenges will require USDA and our agencies to pursue a coordinated approach alongside USDA stakeholders, including state, local, and tribal governments. USDA touches the lives of all Americans each day in so many positive ways. In the Biden-Harris Administration, USDA is transforming America's food system with a greater focus on more resilient local and regional food produc-

tion, fairer markets for all producers, ensuring access to safe, healthy and nutritious food in all communities, building new markets and streams of income for farmers and producers using climate smart food and forestry practices, making historic investments in infrastructure and clean energy capabilities in rural America, and committing to equity across the Department by removing systemic barriers and building a workforce more representative of America. Water rule reversal a blow to ag

American Farm Bureau Federation President Zippy Duvall commented recently on the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) announcement of its intention to reverse the Navigable Waters Protection Rule.

"The American Farm Bureau Federation is extremely disappointed in the Environmental Protection Agency's announcement of its intention to reverse the environmentally conscious Navigable Waters Protection Rule, which finally brought clarity and certainty to clean water efforts. Farmers and ranchers care about clean water and preserving the land, and they support the Navigable

Waters Protection Rule.

"Administrator Regan recently recognized the flaws in the 2015 Waters of the U.S. Rule and pledged not to return to those overreaching regulations. We are deeply concerned that the EPA plans to reverse the Navigable Waters Protection Rule, which puts the future of responsible protections at risk. We expected extensive outreach, but today's announcement fails to recognize the concerns of farmers and ranchers.


"This is an important moment for Administrator Regan and will be pivotal to his ability to earn the trust of farmers on this and other administration priorities. He must keep his word to recognize the efforts of

agriculture and not return to flawed, overly complicated and excessive regulations.

"We call on EPA to respect the statute, recognize the burden that overreaching regulation places on farmers and ranchers, and not write the term 'navigable' out of the Clean Water Act. On this issue, and particularly prior converted croplands and ephemerals, we also urge Secretary Vilsack to ensure that we don't return to the regulatory land grab that was the 2015 WOTUS Rule.

"Clean water and clarity are paramount, and that is why farmers shouldn't need a team of lawyers and consultants to farm."

Kane County Farm Bureau had the pleasure of working alongside state commodity organizations representing corn, soybean, beef and pork producers, and Illinois Farm Bureau, to prepare for a visit from U.S. Congressman Glenn "GT" Thompson of Pennsylvania in early June. Thompson is the ranking Republican and Minority Leader on the U.S. House Agriculture Committee. He is shown below on stage addressing a crowd of farm leaders from across Northern and Central Illinois, and at right visiting with farm hosts Chris and Dana Gould of Maple Park before his afternoon address. The Farm Bureau appreciates the Gould's flexibility in making the farmstead available on short notice, and their hospitality to help Illinois agriculture put its best foot forward.

2021 Young Leader Discussion Meet

The Discussion Meet is a competition promoted by the Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) State Young Leader Committee.

Farm Bureau's strength depends on its members' ability to analyze agricultural issues and decide on solutions that best meet their needs. The competition is designed to simulate a committee meeting where dis-

cussion and active participation are expected from each committee member.

Applicants build basic discussion skills, develop a keen understanding of important agricultural issues and explore how groups can pool knowledge to reach consensus and solve problems.

The IFB State Young Leader Committee and the IFB Member

Engagement Department will coordinate the program at the district and state levels.

District winners will compete in the state contest at the 2021 IAA Annual Meeting, December 4-7.

Eligibility

• Competitors shall be an Illinois Farm Bureau member (MM, MS, PM, PS, or A) between the ages of 18 and 35 in good standing with their County Farm Bureau in the membership system (as of 7 days prior to the district contest). A dependent member may compete if they are between the ages of 18 and 22, not married, and a child of an active MM, MS, PM, PS, or A member in good standing.

• The individual shall have reached his/her 18th birthday at the time of the district contest and shall not have reached his/her 36th birthday by Jan. 31, 2022.

• Competitors must be actively engaged in agriculture.

• Competitor(s) may compete in the Discussion Meet AND either the Achievement Award OR Excellence in Agriculture Award in the same year, however, if the applicant were to be named State Winner in multiple programs, they may only go on to represent one program in the national competition.

IFB investing funds for educational, agricultural products

The Illinois Farm Bureau Board of Directors recently granted \$176,900 to help fund projects undertaken by 10 Illinois organizations and universities.

"IFB is pleased to be able to provide funding support for these projects," said Richard Guebert Jr., IFB president. "We view our financial contribution as an investment to improve Illinois agriculture."

Brian Duncan, IFB vice president and finance committee chairman, reflected on multiple benefits: "The public-private

and assist with securing tools or support to continue farming.

Funding will be used to provide consultation and referral services to farmers with disabilities. Those could include professional consultations with a physical therapist and occupational therapist.

A quarterly webinar series, hosted by the program's director and featuring guest speakers, will cover a variety of health and safety topics.

Children's Discovery Museum

The Children's Discovery Museum in Normal promotes learning and playing activities for children throughout Illinois.

The museum is in the initial planning stages to update its 12-year-old AgMazing exhibit that showcases agriculture. Young visitors plant seeds, investigate crop stress, virtually drive a tractor or combine, milk a cow or follow soybean production from farm to table.

The museum, which was closed for more than a year during the COVID-19 pandemic, is recovering to fulfill its mission.

Illinois 4-H Foundation

Funding will be used for the 4-H Junior Livestock Conference, a two-day, hands-on event for 4-H members in seventh through ninth grades from across the state. Participants will focus on leadership, team building and animal advocacy. They will be introduced to careers in the livestock industry.

Funding will support 20 Illinois 4-H State Livestock Ambassadors who will plan and implement the Junior Livestock Conference and travel around the state to give livestock presentations and perform other duties.

Illinois FFA

Illinois Association FFA state officers and staff conducted three state conventions in different regions to accommodate the five FFA districts and state COVID-19 restrictions. Funding supported the traveling state FFA conventions.

Illinois Farm Bureau was recognized at each of the conventions as a supporter, provided a welcome during convention videos and remarks to convention participants. IFB had a social media presence throughout the convention.





Horseradish

Hot stuff!

- Illinois is the number one producer of horseradish.
- Annually we grow an estimated 1,500 acres of horseradish.
- More than two-thirds of our nation's supply of this vegetable root comes from Madison and St. Clair counties in southwestern Illinois.
- The cold winters of Illinois

provide the required root dormancy, and the long summers provide excellent growing conditions for horseradish.

- Collinsville is known as the "Horseradish Capital of the World," and supplies roughly 60% of the world's horseradish.
- In the U.S., an estimated 24 million pounds of horseradish root are ground and processed annually to yield six

million gallons of prepared horseradish.

- The root has a very strong, pungent flavor that has been known to clear people's sinuses.
- Horseradish is a root. It is still planted and harvested mostly by hand.
- It is naturally rich in many key nutrients like calcium, dietary fiber, folate, manganese, and magnesium.

Individual savory horseradish bread puddings

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tsp. unsalted butter, softened
- 1 1/4 cups heavy cream
- 6 large eggs, at room temperature
- 1/4 cup prepared white horseradish
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 3 cups small-diced white sandwich bread, such as Pepperidge Farm Original (about 5 slices), with crusts
- 1 cup freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano
- 3 Tbs. thinly sliced fresh chives

DIRECTIONS:

1. Position a rack in the center of the oven and heat the oven to 400°F. Grease a 12-cup non-stick muffin tin with the butter.
2. In a 4-cup liquid measur-

ing cup, thoroughly whisk the cream and eggs. Whisk in the horseradish, 1 tsp. salt, and a few grinds of pepper and set aside.

3. Portion half of the bread cubes evenly among the 12 muff-



cheese, and chives.

4. Whisk the custard again and carefully pour it into the muffin cups, distributing it evenly. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.

5. Bake until the puddings are set and the tops are nicely browned and puffed, 18 to 22 minutes. Let cool in the pan for 20 minutes. Carefully remove the puddings from the pan, running a paring knife around the edge of the puddings if they stick. *Makes 12.*

Grow your own horseradish

1. With horseradish root in hand, cut off the top half of the root (bottom half used for planting purposes)

2. In a roomy container of at least 18 inches by 18 inches, use nutrient rich, well-loosened soil to begin planting (you will need one container per one plant).

Place the root at an angle (45 degrees works best). Bury the root so 2 inches are peeking out from the soil.

3. Give it time to grow, literal-

ly. It is a perennial, so plant it and let it do its thing. Just give the root a good 2 inches of water a week.

4. In about a year, your horseradish will reach maturity. Dig up the main root, wash, store in a cool place and enjoy in a variety of recipes!

HORSERADISH CHICKEN TACOS

Recipe



Illinois proudly ranks as the highest producing state for horseradish. In fact, Collinsville, Illinois is known as the "Horseradish Capital of the World," and supplies roughly 60% of the world's horseradish.



INGREDIENTS

- Taco Ingredients**
- 2 large sweet onions, thinly sliced
 - 2 tbsp. plus 1 tsp. extra virgin olive oil, divided
 - 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cut into strips
 - 1 tsp. cumin
 - 1 tsp. coriander
 - 1 tsp. freshly ground pepper
 - 8 (8-inch) multigrain tortillas
 - 2 cups baby spinach

- Horseradish Sauce Ingredients**
- 1 cup light sour cream
 - 1/3 cup red onion, finely chopped
 - 2 tsp. lime juice
 - 4 tsp. prepared horseradish

DIRECTIONS

1. Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large skillet over high heat. Add onions and sauté for 5 minutes. Add red pepper and sauté another 5 minutes, until onions are translucent, and the peppers have softened. Remove from heat and set aside.
2. Season chicken strips with cumin, coriander and black pepper.
3. Heat remaining 1 teaspoon oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Cook strips 3 to 4 minutes on each side or until no longer pink.
4. Meanwhile, whisk together sauce ingredients in a medium bowl. Warm tortillas according to package instructions.
5. Place 1/4 cup spinach over each tortilla. Divide chicken evenly over spinach. Top with onion, peppers and horseradish sauce.

Hot fact: Illinois No. 1 in horseradish

As a kid, I only knew horseradish as the white, hot condiment that Mom enjoyed on her roast beef sandwich. As an adult, I learned a cool fact about the vegetable with sinus-clearing heat: Illinois ranks No. 1 in horseradish production. Farmers in southwest Illinois grow two-thirds of the nation's supply, easily winning the horse(radish) race with more than double the acreage of No. 2 California.

Illinois' horseradish reign can add some flavor to picnic table talk and even the picnic

food itself, appropriate during July, dubbed National Horseradish Month. Squirt some prepared horseradish on a hot dog. Add it to the picnic

meatloaf. Shave some raw root onto a tossed salad. People even toast the vegetable in Bloody Mary cocktails during a competition at the International Horseradish Festival in Collinsville, where festivalgoers also hurl roots for sport.

Noticeably different from Illinois' dominant landscape of corn and soybeans, horseradish is a root crop. Its above-ground leaves resemble oversized, three-foot-tall greens. Its white root delivers the heat desired in condiments and popular on prime rib. Rob Gerstenecker's family has grown horseradish for around 50 years near the

Mississippi River basin, the "American Bottoms" where the crop thrives in the rich soils and climate.

Horseradish production delivers another set of busy seasons for the Gersteneckers, also corn and soybean farmers. Before corn and soybean planting, they plant and harvest final horseradish roots in early spring. After corn and soybean harvest, they harvest most of their roots, then clean and pack roots through the end of the year, saving quality finger roots for "seed" to plant the following year.

Each root is planted, weeded, harvested and packed by hand (I repeat, by hand), making the crop's labor demands as intense as its heat. The family hires extra hands to help, and Rob estimates one day of work in the field equals up to three days of work in the shed to prepare roots for shipment to the farm's buyers, which include proces-

sors in Maryland and Ohio.

During the growing season, farmers hire Rob to scout for bugs and diseases in horseradish fields, including in the top-producing counties of Madison, St. Clair and Monroe. At home, his family enjoys horseradish in spaghetti sauces and on meats off the grill. For the amateur, he

suggests adding horseradish to foods enjoyed with onions to taste test and support Illinois' hot crop.

Webinar series on ecosystem market opportunities

The Illinois Sustainable Agriculture Partnership (ISAP) will be holding a free, four-part webinar series this summer,

exploring new ecosystem services market opportunities for Midwest farmers. The series will provide farmers and their

advisors with practical and straightforward information on innovative market incentives.

The webinars will be held on Tuesday, June 22, Thursday, June 24, Tuesday, July 13 and Thursday, July 15, 2021 from 11:30 AM – 12:30 PM CDT. The webinars will feature programs available from input providers such as Bayer, Corteva and Nutrien; explore innovative markets and data platforms available from CIBO, Farmers Business Network, and Land O'Lakes; examine market opportunities through the lens of the agricultural supply chain companies Cargill, General Mills, and PepsiCo; and investigate water quality markets and additional potential revenue streams for ecosystem services.

"Interest in ecosystem mar-

kets continues to rise, and with all the new options popping up it is difficult to decide which program, if any, may be a good fit for a particular operation," says Emily Bruner, American Farmland Trust Midwest Science Director. "ISAP's goal with this series is to develop a portfolio of resources to inform farmer decisions and build confidence around navigating market and innovative incentive opportunities."

The event is hosted by ISAP with help from more than 20 organizations spanning across Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin. The adoption of practices like no-till, cover crops, pasture management, and agroforestry can sequester carbon in the soil and reduce greenhouse gases by soaking up carbon that would

otherwise trap heat in the atmosphere. Expanding financial incentives and markets for carbon and other ecosystem services present an opportunity for Midwest farmers to combat climate change while improving water quality and building on-farm resiliency and profitability.

the environment," said Jerry Costello II, Director, IDOA. "I encourage farmers to gather containers they are planning to dispose and take them to the nearest collection site to be repurposed."

The program is a cooperative venture between the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Container Recycling Council, GROW-MARK, Inc., Illinois Fertilizer

and Chemical Association, G. Phillips and Sons, L.L.C., Illinois Farm Bureau, and the University of Illinois Extension.

Orr Agricultural Research


Center-University of Illinois- John Wood Community College

Did you know? It ain't the heat, it's the humidity. The process of losing water from leaves is known as transpiration. An acre of corn transpires about 3,000-4,000 gallons of water each day!

Don't miss out on Fresh Peaches

The Kane County Farm Bureau is now taking orders for juicy, homegrown Peaches fresh from Rendleman Orchards, a southern Illinois grower.

These delicious peaches are washed, hydro-cooled, graded to U.S. #1 Extra, 2 1/2 inches and up in size, approximately 60 packaged in a 25 lb wax coated fancy box with a lid. They are delivered to our office on Randall Road the morning of pickup in a refrigerated truck for freshness and long lasting quality.

The grower recommends the peaches, which are available in the month of August, for their sweetness and juicy flavor. If you like to make peach pie or cobbler, or you like to can or freeze peaches, now is the time to take advantage of this once a year offer.

Peaches are highly perishable. They are shipped when they are a little green so that when they arrive they are not bruised with juice running out of the box. The grower recommends that the peaches be refrigerated immediately when you get them unless you are planning to can or freeze them within the next day. Then when you want to use them, you can take out however many you think you will use in the next day, let them sit out in a paper sack overnight, and they should be ripe and ready to eat or cook with. Peaches should not be out of the refrigerator for more than 24 hours. If they are left out too long, they are very susceptible to mold.

The price for a 25 lb box is \$43.00 for members and \$40.85 for Plus status members, who always receive a 5% discount. PAYMENT IS DUE WITH ORDER. You can order by filling out the form and sending it in with your check, or call the Farm Bureau at 630-584-8660 and pay with a Visa, MasterCard, or Discover. Pickup will be Monday, August 16 from 10:00am – 5:30pm at the Farm Bureau office, west side of the building.
