Senator Villa & Rep. Hernandez gather groceries for food pantries Farm Bureau's 20th annual Shopping Spree donates \$1,000s to hunger relief

The Farm Bureau's 20th Anniversary Shopping Spree for local food pantries was conducted in a more subdued fashion than usual in February. An event that in the past has featured cheerleaders, a crowd of volunteers and even a marching band was conducted more quietly and without public notice in 2021. The event was arranged thus in deference to the health and safety of front line workers at the Jewel store on Randall Road in Batavia, our host for all 20 of the Shopping Sprees.

Regardless of the crowd, and the outdoor cold, it was an ideal day for Senator Karina Villa and Representative Barbara Hernandez to participate in a heated race for Kane County Farm Bureau's 20th annual Shopping Spree for food pantries. The two raced through the aisles of the Batavia Jewel-Osco, and helped to benefit local food pantries. During their 7-minute dash around the store, the pair collected \$3,088.14 in groceries, purchased by the Kane County Farm Bureau and donated to Elburn & Countryside Food Pantry and the Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry in Aurora.

Steve Arnold, KCFB Manager, began the pre-event announcements. He explained the concept of the Food Check-Out Week and why KCFB sponsors this celebration of food and farming.

"The event is traditionally held during February and is devoted to hunger relief, while teaching consumers how to stretch their grocery dollars with healthy, nutritious food," said Arnold.

Online produce safety training

Illinois growers seeking FSMA Produce Safety compliance can attend a virtual twoday session to meet the conditions of the FSMA Produce Rule. Farm Bureau will partner with other to host the 2021 Virtual Produce Safety Training March 23-24 during a live Zoom session.

The first-day session will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 2:15 p.m. The second-day session will begin at 10 a.m. and end at 2:30 p.m. Both will have a 30-minute lunch break at noon. Participants must be present for the entire program with their camera on to receive certification.

Instruction time over the two days will cover: Introduction to Produce Safety, Worker Health, Hygiene and Training, Soil Amendments and many more topics.

KCFB members may register now through March 10 for \$5; non-members \$25. Limited to 25 participants. Costs have been reduced through grant funding and include the cost of certification and manual, a value of \$100.





meeting of the Nominating Committee and dinner, the Board meeting commenced with Directors attending virtually, and appropriately socially distanced in-person.

After the Call to Order, Roll Call, Pledge of Allegiance and Approval of the Agenda, Directors received minutes, financial statements and membership reports; reviewed contracts including building improvements, summer landscaping and a fiber-optic agreement; distributed Committee

agendas from recent meetings of the Finance and Young Farmers Committee; and, received reports on the progress of the 2020 Audit and a Cares Act Employee Retention Tax Credit filing.


Bob Gehrke, for-

mer KCFB President and current Chair of the Food-for-Thought Regional Advertising Committee provided an update on the work of the 16 county Farm Bureaus engaged in the consumer outreach group. Gehrke reported that the group had an approximate \$40K budget for 2021 from County Farm Bureau contributions and an Illinois Farm Bureau "match." After deliberation, nearly half was committed to running :30

ads produced by Illinois Farm Families on various streaming services and on YouTube. An additional 10K was earmarked for maintenance of Food-for-Thought signage at Brookfield Zoo and a presence in the Zoo's communications, as well as opportunity for a physical presence of CFB's in 2021 Zoo promotional events. The remainder of the budget will be used to

address current events in agriculture through the summer/fall

KCFB staff provided updates in their areas of responsibility, including a report from 42+ year veteran Bookkeeper Audre Member Services Pack. Coordinator Liz Polovin reported on membership retention and recruitment programs proposed for 2021, including programs to encourage and incentivize affiliated company personnel. Membership Assistant Sindhu Saveen told the Board about her



responsibilities in database developing management, KCFB Foundation. Staff reports were concluded by Communications Coordinator Alice Macha, who walked the Directors through a preview of a new Kane County Farm Bureau website that will be published in March.

Directors shared concerns on a number of topics in a monthly open forum, including news of improved crop varieties for animal feed; thanks for information



on local grants; harm caused to dairy farmers by changes in milk pricing in the last Farm Bill; concerns about rising property taxes and energy costs; the cost to the farm community of redirecting \$30 billion to climate initiatives; and, the importance of responding to Action Requests from Illinois Farm Bureau and AFBF. Directors were also reminded of the March 27 drive-thru pork chop dinner fundraiser for 4-H & Extension. Tickets will be available at the Farm Bureau until the

Collins also announced numerous contributions to the AGCO scholarships administered by the KCFB Foundation, from employees of AGCO Parts in Batavia. He circulated a new "Farm Bureau Pop Quiz" on farm and food topics, coming to the KCFB Facebook page regularly to help spread agricultural literacy.

Get your soil ready for spring

Kane County Farm Bureau offers soil testing to its members at a discount, a great service the Farm to make sure your soil is ready for spring planting. Three different tests available and results are sent by e-mail or mail directly to you. Why test your soil? Soil in its natural state is rarely fertile enough for the best growth of plants. Usually it is necessary to replenish the earth's store of plant nutrients to obtain the most vigorous lawn, the most abundant and brilliant flowers, the prettiest trees and shrubs and the greatest yield of fresh

veggies.

When is the best time to test soil? Proper sampling is important to obtain accurate results. Samples can be taken any time during the warmer months, when soil temperatures are at least 55 degrees. If the soil is too wet to spade, rototill or hoe, it is generally too wet to take a sample. On the other hand, extremely dry soil should not be sampled either.

How often should I test? Ideally, soil should be tested every 3-5 years, more frequently with intensive use. Try to sample during the same season each time for the best comparison.

Why does Farm Bureau provide this service? Kane County Farm Bureau was founded in 1912 as the Kane County Farm Improvement Association, to help farmers improve their production practices and increase the fertility and productivity of their soil. This program is an extension of that. It helps you take the guess work out of gardening!

Basic PH Test

\$20 per sample for members, \$30 non-members This test checks for soil pH, phosphorus, and potassium.

Lawn/Garden Test

timing of fertilizer. Lawn/Garden Plus

\$50 per sample for members, \$60 non-members

This test includes the Lawn & Garden test plus nutrients, iron, zinc, manganese, copper, sulfur and boron. This test also includes recommendations.



AG LITERACY CORNER

Hello Kane County! Can we believe it's already March! Good news for us – that means warmer weather is just around the corner and spring will be here before we know it! With the thought of warmer weather on the way, I can't help but think of symbolism that it holds. Shaking off the old and in with new opportunities, growth, development and the beauty that will soon bloom.

Speaking of new opportunities to blossom, I recently attended a Zoom meeting with other Ag Literacy Coordinators and we learned about two new platforms where teachers, students, and their families can go to make the connection and realize not only the importance but the impact of agriculture in our everyday life.

The first resource we were introduced to focuses on science through the lens of agriculture on a site called *Nourishthe future.org*. This site is full of FREE resources and content and they also offer events and workshops to train and educate teach-

ers about various topics connecting science and agriculture. The six main content areas include: biotechnology, energy/ ethanol, growing America, populations, soils and sustainability, and water equality. While this site is mainly targeted for middle and high school educators, lessons and activities may be adapted for younger students.

How will we sustainably feed nearly 10 billion people by the year 2050? The second resource, Journey2050.com helps students answer this big looming question by taking them on a virtual simulation that explores world food sustainability. And one of the best parts is that teachers do not need an agricultural background to facilitate the learning outcomes. A special feature of this program is that it offers students the opportunity

It reads: "Feeding the world is the responsibility of all. We need to think about the

ways we act now so that future generations and our natural environment may prosper."

National Ag Day is a great opportunity to take a step back and realize all of the things made possible from the hard-working men and women in this field. Did you eat today? Did you put clothes on? Do you have a safe and warm place to sleep at night? If the answers to these questions are yes, we need to thank the agricultural community for it. National Ag Day is also a time to recognize the impact of sustainable agriculture for the generations to come and what we can do today for a better tomorrow.

S.P.R.O.U.T.S. 2021

In another COVID related concession, KCFB is approaching its program of Spring Reading and Outreach to Urban Teachers and Students (SPROUTS) from several angles in 2021.

This program traditionally consisted of sending volunteers

into 3rd grade classrooms in the spring to read a popular children's book about farming, food or agriculture. Volunteer readers were provided resource "kit" and topical Ag Mags to supplement the classroom visits, and a copy of the

book to be left for the school or classroom library.

Bob was a former KCFB Director and Alyce a member of the organization's Women's Committee. Both were tireless promoters of Farm Bureau and agricultural literacy.

Tuesday, March 23 What is Ag Day?

It's a day to recognize and celebrate the abundance provided by agriculture. Every year, producers, agricultural associations, corporations, universities, government agencies and countless others across America join together to recognize the contributions of agriculture. National Ag Days falls during National Ag Week.

What is Ag Day all about?

Ag Day is about recognizing – and celebrating – the contribution of agriculture in our everyday lives. The National Ag Day program encourages every American to:

• Understand how food and fiber products are produced.

- Value the essential role of agriculture in maintaining a strong economy.
- Appreciate the role agriculture plays in providing safe, abundant and affordable products.

Why celebrate agriculture?

Agriculture provides almost everything we eat, use and wear on a daily basis. But too few people truly understand this contribution. This is particularly the case in our schools, where students may only be exposed to agriculture if they enroll in related vocational training.

Each American farmer feeds more than 165 people ... a dramatic increase from 25 people in the 1960s. Quite simply,

American agriculture is doing more – and doing it better. As the world population soars, there is an even greater demand for the food and fiber produced in the United States.

Seed germination with egg cartons

Materials

Paper egg carton Potting soil Seeds Toothpicks Plastic Wrap

Directions

Take an empty paper egg carton and poke a small hole in the bottom



- 2. Fill each individual dimple with seed-starting soil
- 3. Plant seeds according to the planting-depth instructions found on the back of the seed packet in each individual dimple
- 4. Mist with water regularly, keeping the soil moist, but not soaked. You may want to keep the carton on a plate so the water doesn't run everywhere
- 5. To give extra warmth and humidity (if needed), cover the top of the egg carton with plastic wrap, which can work as a little tent. Use the toothpicks to prop it up.
- 6. Place the carton in a sunny spot and watch the plants grow!
- 7. Once the seeds start to sprout, cut apart the individual dimples and plant the seedlings straight in your prepared garden or pot. No need to remove the sprouting seed from the carton, plant the whole thing!

Young Farmers coloring contest




