KCFB Board meeting review

The regular monthly meeting of the Kane County Farm Bureau Board of Directors was held on October 5th, 2017 and was called to order by Vice President Wayne Schneider. Following the call to order, the board reviewed the consent agenda and gave their monthly reports.

In unfinished business, Steve Arnold presented American Tower Corporation's counter offer and the board approved an extension on the Cell Tower lease. Other items presented included examining the cost of adding ceiling fans in the board room and the status of bids for the sidewalk and parking lot.

Also in unfinished business, Arnold reported on the audit engagement correspondence and the board then went through details of the IAA Annual Meeting, located this year at the Palmer House from December 2-5.

In new business, cost-saving initiatives were analyzed and a motion to replace the current parking lot lights with LED ones carried. Also reviewed was the renegotiated Waste Management Contract that reduced the monthly fee by nearly 85%.

Mike Kenyon, Treasurer, shared the financials and the Quarterly Investment Portfolio and was followed by President Joe White giving his report. President White focused the direction of his report on the recent hurricanes in Texas and Florida, as was discussed in the IFB Board Meeting. It was decided that KCFB would

donate \$500 towards helping those affected by Hurricane Irma, as was previously funded to helping those affected by Hurricane Harvey.

The Manager's Report, given by Steve Arnold, covered a variety of topics. It was decided that the District 1 meeting will be held on November 21st at 7 pm at the McHenry County Farm Bureau. At the KCFB office, a new communications specialist, Marty Keltner, will be starting on October 9th. In other news, the media requests from Northwest Quarterly, Crain's Chicago Business, and the Illinois Farmer Today were fulfilled. New vacation destination options for 2018 from Mayflower Tours are being featured: America's Canyon Country, featuring Four National Parks, and Colorado's Historic Trains, featuring Five Scenic Rail Excursions and Three National Parks. Arnold also reported that exciting new benefits created by a partnership with John Deere means that current and new KCFB members can bypass the standard requirements to become a program member of the GreenFleet Platinum 2 for free, for two years! Last, but not least, Ford is offering a \$500 cash bonus to military and first responders that can be used on top of the \$500 cash bonus offered to current and new KCFB members. Restrictions apply and eligibility must be determined.

In Local Government Reports, FPD President Mike Kenyon, reported on the purchase of properties. The Kane County Agriculture Committee Report was given by Steve Arnold along with the Stormwater Ordinance, Agriculture Sub-Committee report. There were no reports given concerning the Farmland Protection Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, or the Regional Planning Commission.

Next up was Donna Lehrer representing the Direct Marketers and Specialty Growers. She briefed the group on "Live Local", the IFB Local/Regional Food Conference being held November 6th and 7th in Bloomington and reminded board members of the necessary due dates for registration. Jerry Gaitsch gave the marketing report on the Argentina/Brazil Issues Tour happening January 27th through February 4th. Contributions were then reported on by Bill Collins. Good Done Great contributed to the KCFB Foundation and both CHS Elburn and Ryan and Juanita Klassy contributed to Harvest for ALL. We thank them for their generosity!

A written report was read, originating from Suzy Myers, in regards to a November 1st Advisory Council Meeting at 3:30 pm for Agriculture in the Classroom (AITC).

For the topic of the AFBF, National Issues, and Activities, it was noted that the AFBF Annual Meeting will be in Nashville, TN January 6th through 9th for 2018.



Farmers invited to apply for FB Argentina/Brazil 'issues tour'

The Illinois Farm Bureau's 2018 Issues Tour, Factors Affecting Competitiveness: Assessing South American Agriculture and Improving our Own, will visit Argentina/Brazil January 27 through February 4, 2018.

The objectives of the 2018 tour are to see how and where South American producers are out-competing American farmers, determine major factors enhancing South American competitiveness (infrastructure, R&D, biofuels and regulatory processes), and develop effective leaders willing to be active spokespersons on those issues at the state and national level.

Participants from around Illinois will be chosen by the Illinois Farm Bureau through an application process. Airfare, meals, ground transportation, and 8 nights lodging are covered in the Issues Tour fee of \$2500. Kane County Farm Bureau will provide a minimum of \$1500 toward that fee for qualified applicants, with the remainder coming from the participant. Participants are also responsible for incidental expenses (passport fee, VISA for Brazil, phone calls, souvenirs, etc.). Additional requirements include pre-trip briefings and post-trip presenta-

for teachers to utilize. The county programs work to integrate agriculture into existing classroom curriculum."

"Kane County AITC reached thousands of children, teachers and general public through the SPROUTS, AG Days, and Touch a Tractor programs. We held 2 summer classes for teachers, as well as an Institute Day class to help teachers learn how to integrate agriculture into their curriculums."

County Coalition Grants are made possible through funding from the IAA Foundation, the charitable arm of the Illinois Farm Bureau. The IAA Foundation raises funds for the Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom program each year, and in addition to county grants, provides funding for Ag Mags, teacher grants, Summer Ag Institutes and more.

"Thanks to the work of local ag literacy coordinators, backed

by the generosity of our individual and industry contributors, the IAA Foundation is able to award an all-time high of \$625,500 in grants to 77 coalitions across the state," said Susan Moore, Director of the IAA Foundation. 
Book of the month



A brief history of football

During the Middle Ages people started to play football. Back then, it was called "townball" and everyone including men, women and children played. Teams consisted of around 200 players. Games usually lasted all day with many injured and some dead. Tired of these injuries, organizers moved the games to a field outside of town, set up with boundary lines, goal lines, and a reduced number of players on the field.

Around the 19th century, football made its way to the United States. Football was a blend of soccer and rugby. Egg-shaped balls were now being used. Length of the playing field was now 100 yards. There were two 30-minute periods, in which to play the game.

Football facts...and an Illinois Connection to football

- Footballs are 11" long and the distance around the football is 28"
- The first football was round
- Players are assigned certain numbers depending on the position they play
- For each play there are 22 players on the field
- 3,000 cows supply the NFL with enough leather for a year's supply of footballs
- A pig's bladder was inflated and used as the ball during early football games
- President Theodore Roosevelt helped develop rules to make the game safer
- Players used to grow their hair long enough to pin it in a bun on top of their head for protection
- The official size of a football field is 120 yards long and 53

yards, 1 foot wide

- 12 new footballs are delivered to officials 2 hours before start of the game. They are marked with a K and used for kicking only.
- Modern Fantasy Football can be traced back to Wilfred "Bill" Winkenbach, a partner in Oakland Raiders.
- Goal posts are 10 feet (3) meters) high
- The Green Bay Packers won the first Super Bowl with a 35-10 win over the Kansas City Chiefs on January 15, 1967.
- The Minnesota Vikings and the San Francisco 49ers hold the each hold the record for most fumbles in a season with 50.

Illinois connections to Football:

1. John Riddell of the John

Riddell Company in Chicago, invented and patented the first plastic football helmet.

- 2. The last NFL player to play in a game without a helmet was Dick Plasman of the 1940 Chicago Bears.
- 3. Since 1941 Wilson Sporting Goods, has been the official ball maker for the NFL.
- 4. Bloomington, Illinois was the home of the Corn Bowl for 8 years. In 1947 the Hybrid Seed Corn Breeders of Illinois co-sponsored the game that was billed as the Greatest Thanksgiving Event in the Mid-West. The Corn Bowl never attracted more than 8,000 spectators. The final Corn Bowl was held in 1955.

Football craft and crafty football bites This football craft project requires very little in the way of

materials and can be completed by almost any age group.

Materials Needed:

Brown paper; newspaper, shredded; white yarn; white paint; scissors; hole punch

Directions:

First shred up several pieces of newspaper. Don't be afraid of child labor - just make sure to clean those hands off afterwards! You'll need guite a bit of stuffing for each football you are making. Fold brown paper in half. Draw your own large oval to use as a template, then draw onto the folded paper.

Punch holes around the perimeter of the football. You can space them however you would like but make sure not to punch too close to the edge.

Tie the yarn around one of the holes to start. Next, thread white yarn through the holes, making sure to stop before it is completely threaded.

Stuff the football with shredded newspaper until the football is full.

Finish threading the yarn through the remaining holes and tie off.

Cut off the remaining yarn and tuck inside.

Recipe from Mom On Timeout INGREDIENTS:

favorite crackers (I used TownHouse because of their size/shape)

summer sausage, sliced thin (about 1/8" thick)

block of cheddar cheese, sliced very thin (about 1/8" thick) ranch dressing

Prep tools

1 small, rinsed-out aluminum can (like from green chiles), or a small round cookie cutter or football shaped cutter. 1 Ziploc bag, or frosting bag

Directions

On a sturdy cutting board, use the aluminum can (or cookie cutter) to shape the cheddar and summer sausage pieces into individual "football" shapes. Then assemble the football "bites", by layering cheddar and summer sausage atop the crackers. Finally, pour some ranch dressing into a Ziploc bag, and then use scissors to snip a very small triangle from one of the bottom corners. Pipe the dressing onto the cheddar to complete the football bites.
