ACTIVATOR, Illinois Farm Bureau's Political Involvement Fund, is a voluntary segregated fund intended to protect and improve the economic and social well-being of farmers. Each year ACTIVATOR tracks voting records of members of the Illinois General Assembly on issues important to agriculture and relevant to farmers. As part of their effort to build relationships with elected officials on both sides of the aisle, Farm Bureau has consistently supported candidates who show support for Illinois agriculture and farmers regardless of their party affiliation. ACTIVATOR's "Friend of Agriculture" designation is a coveted title for both rural and urban members of Congress and the General Assembly. A favorable voting record of a minimum 60% support of Farm Bureau policy positions as well as a recommendation of a majority of District ACTIVATOR trustees is required to earn a legislator the title "Friend of Agriculture." This title and award recognizes incumbent legislators for their support of agriculture.

This year ACTIVATOR presented this prestigious "Friend of Agriculture" award to 12 Kane County state legislators. Those who attended the KCFB awards recognition September 1 included Senator Jim Oberweis (25th District), Senator Karen McConnaughay (33rd District), Representative Anna Moeller (43rd District), Representative Mike Fortner (49th District), Representative Keith Wheeler (50th District), Representative Robert Pritchard (70th District) and Representative Stephanie Kifowit (84th district). Each "Friend of Agriculture" was gifted a commemorative John Deere model 8345R tractor on a white oak base plaque to publicly display their support for Illinois

The Food Bank sought advice to provide maximum benefit in terms of food production, educational opportunities, community support and public relations.

The Young Farmers committee and the two representatives from the food bank spearheading the project met on Tuesday, August 30. The purpose of the meeting was to help educate the food bank about the production, machinery, and labor costs associated with growing local foods as well as the educational opportunities that having a farm can provide them. The group was able to answer questions, give advice and beneficial information as to how to best use the land to produce desirable produce for the food bank and to discuss potential farm managers

to operate the farmland for the Food Bank.

As a result of the meeting, the Young Farmers committed to providing primary tillage, planting, spraying and harvesting of the 25 acre farm for the Food Bank in 2017 and until a long range plan for expanding vegetable production, education, PR and community support can be developed. Young Farmers also pledged to assist the Food Bank in making contacts for soliciting donations of crop inputs for 2017.

KCFB Board Review

Sept. 1

The September meeting of the KCFB of Directors immediately followed the dinner on the Patio with ACTIVATOR "Friends of Agriculture." The ACTIVATOR "Friends of Agriculture" awards were presented to the following legislators: Senator Jim Oberweis, Senator Karen McConnaughay, Representative Anna Moeller, Representative Mike Fortner, Representative Keith Wheeler, Representative Robert Pritchard, and Representative Stephanie *Kifowit.*

KCFB Manager Steve Arnold delivered the membership report and announced that KCFB achieved its total member quota on August 31 with 980 voting members. Several directors reported about agricultural topics and local issues.

Arnold's report continued with a recap about a number of items including the AFBF Staff

Conference report from August 9-11, mentioned the Bartlett High School League of Scholars meeting to be held on September 13, and invited the board to participate in a Solar farm solicitation survey. Directors also gave a recap and reported on ACTIVA-TOR Trustee meetings, the Kane County Cougars **KCFB** Foundation fundraiser game in August, and the recent Brookfield Zoo "Summer Nights" Food for Thought Committee event. Lastly, new Farm Bureau opportunities were announced regarding Co-op Advertising Grants and Consumer Communication Grants.

In the Government affairs arena Wayne Schneider spoke about the Keep Ag in the Green with Atrazine report. He covered the talking points and requested a postcard to be completed by each Board member by October. This report threatens the use of herbicide in the

Corn belt.

In FOUNDATION news a Super C tractor is now for sale. Proceeds from the sale will go towards the FOUNDATION. In other FOUNDATION news, this years' 2017 raffle prize, a 1965 Ford F100 has been purchased. This truck shows 40,401 original miles and could be a potentially successful change to the raffle. Correspondence for the Cubs game on September 20, and the Fair Oaks Farm Tour set for October 29 fundraisers was distributed to the Board Members. Also new for this year - Harvest decorations to raise money for scholarships will be for sale at the Farm Bureau this fall.

In Young Farmers news, a meeting was held on August 30 with Northern Illinois Food Bank (NIFB) representatives to discuss the use of 20 gifted acres to NIFB.

Upcoming regional and

statewide Farm Bureau meetings include the Illinois Farm Bureau annual meeting that will be held December 3-6 at the Palmer House Hilton, and the AFBF & National Issues & Activities Annual Meeting in Phoenix on January 7-10.

Lastly, in other news KCFB President Joe White taped an NBC 5 news segment on crop conditions on August 22, it was noted that Eldon Gould received

the "Torch of Leadership" award from the IALF on August 27, and on August 22 at Windy Acres Farm the Illinois Farm Families taped a video by Kristin Srail for the Illinois Farm Families blog titled "Let's talk about what's on your table".

The next scheduled Kane County Farm Bureau Board meeting will be held Thursday, October 4 at 7:30pm.

What do presidential candidates know about Agriculture?

It's been almost 150 years since two men who had farmed squared off against each other in a presidential election, and it may never happen again. But candidates don't need firsthand experience to understand the needs of farmers and ranchers or to appreciate the work they do. As President Eisenhower said, "You know, farming looks mighty easy when your plow is a pencil, and you're a thousand miles from the corn field."

What do the 2016 presidential candidates know about agriculture? Democrat Hillary Clinton attended school in Park Ridge, Illinois, where the general headquarters of the American Farm Bureau Federation once was located. Chances are she wasn't aware of Farm Bureau or farm issues as a young person.

Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump feels at home in Manhattan where he negotiated real estate deals that's the borough of New York City, not Manhattan, Kansas.

Sometimes life throws you chances which come around once in a lifetime. I was lucky enough to have this happen to me recently. My daughter had a business trip to London and Zurich, my grandson didn't have school yet, and I was able to take off a week from work to be my grandson's escort when she was in meetings. The three of us walked many miles a day, laughed a lot, saw things we'd always wanted to and made some wonderful memories.

Unlike most of my travels, there wasn't much time to prepare for this trip, but I did as much research as possible. We all flew to London, where we visited Greenwich – learning about the Greenwich Mean Time, and of course, stood on

the Prime Meridian at 0 degrees. To have a foot on each side of the earth was an exciting thing, not to be forgotten.

We made many trips on the "Tube." Thanks to an app that laid out the pathway of each trip, we found this to be an easy way to travel. Some of the trips on the "Tube" lead us to the Arsenal Soccer Stadium, Tower of London, Buckingham Palace, Nike town (my grandson is 13 ... this was visited for him), Winston Churchill's War Rooms, Big Ben, the London Eye, and much more.

On a long day's excursion, we visited Windsor Castle, the town of Bath – home of the Roman baths and then Stonehenge. Some folks say that Stonehenge is just some big

products on about a quarter of the state's land, so the value of agriculture must not be overlooked in the Empire State.

In the nation's history, some candidates arrived on the campaign scene with a good knowledge of agriculture and a strong desire to win the farm vote. President Truman not only tried his hand at farming but was a county Farm Bureau president as a young man. His rural background helped him defeat a more citified Thomas Dewey. President Carter's family owned a peanut farm and warehouse at Plains, Georgia.

In the election of 1868, both Republican and Democratic candidates had been farmers. Democrat Horatio Seymour preferred farming to holding political office and is said to be the only presidential candidate ever compelled to run against his will. Convention delegates drafted him over his strong objection. He lost to Gen. Ulysses S. Grant who farmed for several years near St. Louis before the Civil War.

Presidential candidates run on party platforms that always include agriculture. Whoever is elected will be advised on agricultural matters by the secretary of agriculture they appoint to their cabinet. President Franklin Roosevelt had Henry A. Wallace to steer the farm economy through the Great Depression and Dust Bowl. Ezra Taft Benson was secretary during both of Eisenhower's terms. President Reagan, who understood the importance of agriculture as former governor of California, relied on John Block and Richard Lyng.

Congress drafts farm legislation, so it is a plus to have men and women in the House and Senate with farm backgrounds. Sen. Mike Johanns, who received American Farm Bureau's Distinguished Service Award this year, grew up on a farm, served as secretary of agriculture under George W. Bush, and senator from Nebraska before his retirement. But there are few like him in Congress anymore.

Perhaps the most we can hope for is that presidential candidates are willing to listen to farmers and ranchers and realize that the federal government doesn't have all the answers. Eisenhower again said it best. "The proper role of government, however, is that of partner with the farmer – never his master." If this year's candidates know little else about American agriculture they should learn that much.

There are many theories, but nothing is for sure. The burial mounds dotting the country-side were easily spotted.

I wonder if I'd have even noticed or thought about this wheat harvest, had I not worked here at the FB ... a thought to ponder.

Then we were on the train to the airport and we again were surrounded by wheat. Once on the plane to Zurich, we saw the wheat fields creating a patchwork quilt of browns and tans. We thought of the fields we saw when flying in the US, the greens, browns, tans of our Midwest soybeans, wheat and corn quilt. What do you think we found in the countryside of Zurich? More wheat ... that's right, even more. This area of Europe was full of wheat.

So, my grandson and I started noticing all the "processed wheat" we encountered in a day. We consumed many different types of "processed wheat", but I think our favorite was the soft pretzel we ate in Zurich.

This once in a lifetime chance to travel together last minute, was a wonderful experi-

ence. I'm so glad we were able to experience this small part of Europe together.

Epilogue: A few years ago, I wrote about taking my grandson to Fair Oaks Farm in Indiana. I received so many comments on that article ... folks wanting to duplicate my experience. 

1/2 cup plain sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 egg white



What You Do: 1. Help your child preheat the oven to 250° Fahrenheit and cover a cookie sheet with a piece of parchment paper.

2. Help your child to separate the egg. Separating an egg is a true talent - so encourage your child to take her time.

- 3. Have your child place the egg white in the mixing bowl and froth lightly with a fork.
- 4. Now she/he can add the pecans and stir with a spatula until they are all evenly coated

5. Give your child a 1/2 cup measuring cup and have her/him measure the sugars into the bowl. Using teaspoons, she/he can also measure and add the salt and cinnamon.

6. After your child has stirred together the ingredients and coated the pecans with the sugar mixture, she/he can evenly spread them on the sheet pan.

7. Now she/he can place the sugared pecans in the oven and let bake for an hour.

8. The finished sweet treats can be enjoyed as is, in a salad, or sprinkled over ice cream or yogurt.

Easy Cranberry Pecan Cookies TOTAL TIME: Prep: 10 min.

Bake: 10 min./batch

1 tube (16½ ounces) refrigerated sugar cookie dough, softened 1 cup chopped pecans 2/3 cup white baking chips 2/3 cup dried cranberries 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, combine cookie dough, pecans, chips, cranberries and vanilla. Drop by tablespoonfuls 2 in. apart onto ungreased baking sheets.
- 2. Bake 10-12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool 2 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks. Store in an airtight container. Yield: about 3-1/2 dozen.

Considering that pecan trees can grow up to 80 feet tall (some grow as high as 150 feet) and spread to a width of 40 to 75 feet, it makes for a pretty good shade.

2. Grilling & smoking meats

Pecan wood is suitable for backyard BBQs, as well as smoking meats.

3. Furniture

Pecan tree wood makes furniture, flooring, and paneling. It is a hard wood that stands up to wear and tear.

4. Cooking oils

Pecan oil is neutral in flavor and takes on the taste of whatever

seasoning is being used with it. It is also considered healthy, as it is rich in monounsaturated fats. It has lower unsaturated fat (9.5%) than olive oil (13.5%), peanut oil (16.90%) or corn oil (12.70%).

5. Pecan shells

Pecan shells can be collected in piles and allowed to age. After a while, they become mulch. Finely ground pecan shells

are added to plastic resin and painted or stained to give it an authentic wood look. Pecan shells or processed

pecan shell pellets serve as an inexpensive source for renewable biofuel.

You can grind small amounts

of pecan shells in a food processor to make soaps, body scrubs and bath salts. The rough granules help exfoliate dead skin cells.

6. Beverages

Distillers and craft brewers use pecans to flavor their spirits and beers.

KANE COUNTY FARMER

Fall has always been my favorite season, as it marks the beginning of some of my favorite activities; fall harvest, apple picking, pumpkin patches, corn mazes, and of course Halloween. We get to say goodbye to the blistering heat and humidity of summer with the crisp smells and cooler breezes of autumn. I personally have no problem trading in my shorts and tank tops for tall boots and vests. And of course, no fall season would be complete without pumpkin flavored everything and lots of pecan pie!

If you go to any store and purchase a pumpkin, there is a good chance that it was grown in Illinois. When it comes to growing pumpkins, Illinois smashes the competition, producing more than 90% of the canning pumpkins in the country. This is largely thanks to the state's climate and soil types. Pumpkins take about 120 days to grow, from planting to harvest

and are rather labor intensive. Seeds are planted in April and May and harvest starts in August, continuing all the way through November. While there are many different varieties of pumpkins, carving pumpkins are my favorite. As a kid, my parents would take my two sisters and me to a local pumpkin patch where we would each get to pick out a pumpkin to carve later on. The outing would always conclude with visit of the apple orchard, a trip through the corn maze, and a warm glass of apple cider. Sadly, the farm we used to visit is no longer open to the public; however I was surprised to discover how many similar farms there are right here in Kane County! 


