# Water testing offered in October

The Kane County Farm Bureau and Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District will offer water testing in October this year. A high quality water supply is vital for families, and well testing helps provide peace of mind and identifies potential problem areas for homeowners in Kane County.

The well testing program has three simple steps: (1) pick up and pay for a water test kit at Kane County Farm Bureau between Monday, Oct. 18-Friday, October 29, (2) at home, collect a water sample as close as possible to turning it in; and (3) return the water sample to KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil & Water Conservation District on Monday, Nov. 1st. Results will

be mailed to your home.

Two kits are available and prices vary:

**A. Basic Package (Nitrate Package)—\$45.00**

Test for nitrate, nitrite, ammonia, chloride, sulfate, soluble phosphorus, silica and specific conductivity.

**B. Metals—\$95.00**

Test for 23 different metals.

All kits include detailed sampling instructions. KCFB or Kane/DuPage Soil and Water Conservation District can provide additional information about each test.

The certified lab at Heidelberg College Water Quality Laboratory in Tiffin, OH tests all samples. The lab is

nationally recognized for its work testing rivers and lakes.

# Anhydrous ammonia training

Illinois Farm Bureau members are invited to enroll in upcoming statewide Anhydrous Ammonia Certified Grower Training sessions to fulfill state requirements on mandatory safety training. Free certified grower trainings will be offered on six dates in fall 2021 through a partnership with Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA), Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) and Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association (IFCA).

Attendance is limited for each session. Growers may register at <http://www.ilfb.org/NH3> to guarantee their seat and learn more information.

Illinois growers and grower farm operators who transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or otherwise maintain anhydrous ammonia equipment, are now required by state regulation (8 IAC 215) to complete certified grower training. The full text of

Growers and grower farm operators have until April 1, 2022 to be initially certified and must participate in refresher training every three years. As a reminder, Anhydrous Ammonia Certified Grower Training can also be fulfilled online at <https://onenet.illinois.gov/page.aspx?item=128037>. Questions and assistance with the training content can be answered by the Illinois Department of

Agriculture at 217-782-3817.

IFB was heavily involved in discussions leading up to this regulatory change and throughout the rule-making process. IFB has continued running a full campaign to educate members about the training requirements. We have also prepared a new set of marketing material for use by the county Farm Bureaus to announce in-person training opportunities.

# National Farm & Safety Week September 20-24, 2021

The 2019 data for the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates that the agricultural sector is still the most dangerous in America with 573 fatalities, or an equivalent of 23.1 deaths per 100,000 workers. Fall harvest time can be one of the busiest and most dangerous seasons of

the year for the agriculture industry. For this reason, the third week of September has been recognized as National Farm Safety and Health Week. This annual promotion initiated by the National Safety Council has been proclaimed as such by each sitting U.S. President since

Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1944. National Farm Safety and Health Week is led by the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS), the agricultural partner of the National Safety Council.

## U of I Extension offers best gardening tips for fall season

As fall approaches, trees begin to change color, cold weather sweeps in, and garden prepping for winter begins.

A free three-part University of Illinois Extension online webinar series will help gardeners prepare for the cold months ahead. Four Seasons Gardening has inspired generations of gardeners. The fall workshops begin at 1:30 p.m. Sept. 14 and will include tips for garden tool maintenance from Extension horticulture educator Richard Hentschel.

Sharp, rust-free tools are easier on the body and make whatever task is at hand quicker to finish, says Hentschel. Make gardening less of a chore by maintaining your equipment.

Fall is a popular time to examine landscape trees. Illinois is home to hundreds of native and non-native tree species, but identifying them isn't always

easy. Leaves, bark, twigs, buds, flowers, boles, and fruit all help in identification. Sarah Vogel, Extension horticulture educator, will help homeowners recognize tree species, both natives and non-natives, based on the size, shape, and appearance, as well as cover the basic parts of trees. The webinar begins at 1:30 p.m. Oct. 19.

Tree root collar disorder affects many trees. A root collar is an important area of a tree where root tissue shifts to trunk tissue. Impacts to this part of the tree can have a variety of symptoms, from yellow foliage and early fall color to dieback in the upper canopy, and even tree death. Extension educator Ryan Pankau will explain how to identify, prevent, and treat trees with root collar disorder during the final fall webinar at 1:30 p.m. Nov. 30.

- Typically requires more hands-on labor
- Transportation and storage space is optimized
- Traditionally easier to handle because of their shape and size, which makes them more ideal for smaller farms

I am a firm believer that you can achieve anything you set your mind to.

You must create momentum one step at a time to keep moving towards the top. Or in my case day by day, rep by rep. Your goals may not be fitness or health related but

whether it is personal, professional, relational, or something in between, momentum forward to the life you want to live is created by small steps forward. Eventually those small steps will turn into longer strides and before you know it you will be racing towards the finish line.

It was in the process of training for my first competition that I fell in love with the sport, learned so much about myself, and found a new sense of confidence. The best part? I found the same lessons I was learning in the gym carried over into my personal and professional life as well as other goals I have set for myself.

Not everything was smooth sailing though. A week prior to my competition I developed cellulitis on my right leg from playing softball. Talk about a big wrench getting

thrown in your plans. I had worked so hard and the end was in sight and I was not about to throw the last nine weeks of

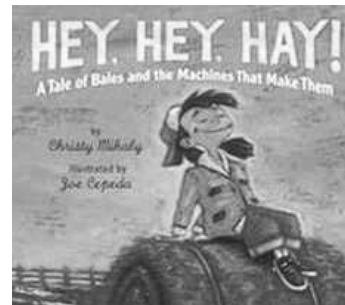
## Book of the month

# Farm Facts @ Fun

## Hey, that's Hay!

Hay is the third largest agricultural crop grown in the United States, behind corn and soybeans.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 55.7 million acres of land are used in hay production, and the total crop exceeds 119 million tons per year, most of which is used domestically to feed cattle, small livestock and the horse industry.

In addition to round and square bales, hay is available in a variety of other forms including cubes and pellets.

Hay is a grass that has been cut, dried, and stored and is most commonly used for animal feed.

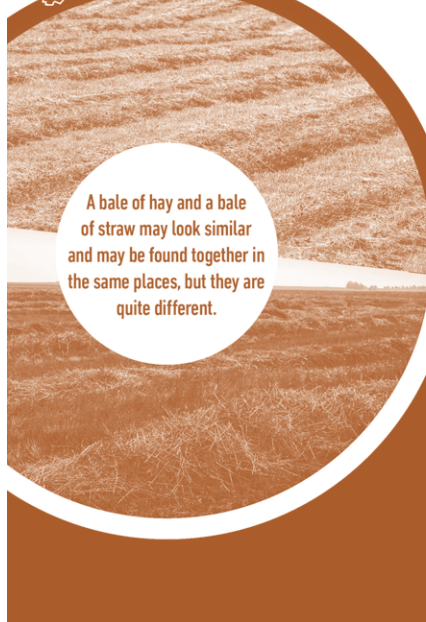
Many people confuse hay with straw. The square bales often sold in the fall for Halloween decorations are bales

of straw. Straw is the stubble that is left after the grains from plants like wheat, oats and rye are removed from the plant. It is

most commonly used in animal bedding, as mulch for gardens and, in some cases, even in the walls of houses.



- Generally, consists of grass or alfalfa and includes leaves
- Main purpose is for livestock feed due to its high nutritional value
- Usually, a light shade of green and it has a slightly sweet smell to it



A bale of hay and a bale of straw may look similar and may be found together in the same places, but they are quite different.

## Hay vs. Straw

- By-product of harvest, usually the hollow stalks and stems from crops like wheat or oats
- Main purpose is for livestock bedding
- Usually, a golden color and it doesn't have much of a smell to it

## Are you cudding? A recipe for haystacks

### Ingredients:

- 1 bag of butterscotch chips
- 2 tsp. creamy peanut butter
- 1 cup of peanuts
- 1 bag of Chow Mein noodles
- Wax paper
- Measuring cup (1 cup)
- Tablespoon (1)
- Microwave safe bowl

Melt butterscotch chips in a microwave safe bowl stirring at 30 second intervals until all the chips are melted and then stir in peanut butter.

Print the Free farm truck template online on white cardstock and use the scissors to cut out truck shape.

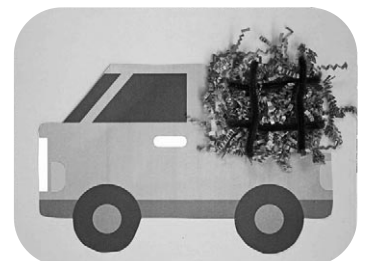
Now take the truck cut out and glue it to the center of another piece of colored paper (Optional: draw and create your own truck)

**Hey, look at the hay**

While some people ho-hum about the drive between here and the Rockies, I noted the hay bales during our summer road trip. The large round bundles of dried fresh grasses or clover dotted the landscape, photo-worthy in most instances. They sat proudly in fields, waterways

and field edges as an iconic symbol of rural America. And they're a major feedstuff for livestock, notably cows that consume more than 30 pounds a day when pasture grass cannot provide.

Iowa farmers baled waterway grasses meandering through corn and soybean fields. Nebraska farmers tended expansive hay fields. Colorado farmers baled against an impressive mountain backdrop. In all those road miles, we

saw equipment parked in barnyards and at field edges but rarely in action. Bales seem to show up like mole hills across the land, often without notice of the process that has evolved dramatically in the last century. This summer, my dad found an antique hay knife in an old barn. It reminded us that farming ancestors used to manually harvest loose hay, stack it in a barn mow and later cut from the compacted pile for feeding livestock.

Today, mechanical balers handle the bundling and tractors the stacking, unless we opt to harvest a rack of small square bales. Most modern-day round bales don't weather-protective

net wrap straight out of the baler, a welcome improvement from my childhood when we fitted each bale with a plastic sleeve for outdoor storage.

Mother Nature's reign over the process spans the generations, remaining in control of when we harvest hay and how much we yield across several cuttings. The sun for haymaking seems to shine more on the weekends. However, most farmers will tell you that mowed hay, a crop that must dry or cure before baling, seems to increase the odds for a pop-up rain shower.

The kids don't share those worries and just enjoy the bundled forage, particularly leaping

across the large round bales lined at the field edge. They also climb bales in the mow, a good place to talk about the differences between the hay and straw stored there.

During Dad's barn cleanup, he also found a vintage pop bottle near the hay knife. I like to imagine that the laborer enjoyed a cola break from his vantage point at the mow window, overlooking a harvested hay field and a job well done.

**"MR. TORNADO"**

**Tornadoes.** Just seeing photos of a twister gives me a gut clench. Perhaps it all started when I was a 4 1/2 year old living in Peoria in the early 1960s, and the shriek of high winds woke me one summer night. I heard the clatter of garbage cans toppling, and a few airborne objects hitting the house. My parents got up and monitored the situation with hushed concern as I lay in bed, terrified, listening to the hostile darkness outside. The

next morning, we learned a weak tornado had touched down about a mile away. Our house was undamaged and we were fortunate, but the event left me with an indelible memory and a sense of unease not salved by a subsequent viewing of The Wizard of Oz. Even though Dorothy landed in lovely Oz, I wanted no part of the tornado that took her there. Even scarier than the flying monkeys!

Fast forward to the early

1970s, when my family had moved to Batavia from a blissfully tornado-free London. We would watch darkening skies and increasing winds with concern, waiting for the tornado siren to sound and then rush to open a couple of windows in the house to equalize pressure and move to the southwest corner of the basement to wait out the fearsome winds. There was very little in the way of early warnings, and much of the protocol we were following has since been debunked.

Fortunately, we never suffered a tornado and equally fortunately, not far from us, a pioneering University of Chicago professor was in the midst of a lifelong mission to study torna-

does and violent weather.

Professor Tetsuya Theodore "Ted" Fujita earned his doctorate in Japan in 1943. He was living in Kokura, Japan in 1945, the primary target for the second WWII nuclear bomb strike, but on the morning of August 9, 1945, the city was obscured by clouds so the bombing strike was conducted on the secondary target of Nagasaki. Dr. Fujita was spared and studied the damage caused by the nuclear explosion to come up with the hypothesis of downbursts and microbursts to explain the strike damage.

Fujita was invited to the University of Chicago in 1953, to help the U.S. Weather Bureau's Thunderstorm Project, with which the government

wanted to use the new advances in satellite photography and aircraft to improve weather forecasting.

Fujita funneled his fascination with storm formation into a lifetime of meticulous evidence gathering and reconstruction of events in numerous tornadoes to assess damage and plot wind speeds. His research led to many terms that we all know nowadays: "wall clouds", the low storm clouds from which tornadoes often descend, and the term "microburst" among them.

His research led to the development of the Fujita scale, the now ubiquitous "F" designation (upgraded in 2007 to the "Enhanced Fujita" (EF) scale) assigned to tornadoes in

response to wind speeds and damage patterns detected during now routine surveys in the aftermath of tornadoes. He also developed the concept of multiple vortex tornadoes.

Fujita also had an enormous contribution to airline safety. In 1975, he was contacted by

Eastern Airlines after their Flight 66 crashed at New York's JFK Airport, killing 122 people. The airline industry had been roiled by a series of large commercial jets with experienced crews seemingly dropping out of the sky without cause, while planes before and after the doomed flights landed safely.

Fujita leapt into full detective mode, reviewing radar images,

flight records, nearby weather patterns and interviewing the pilots of planes that had landed safely. He suspected a phenomenon called a "downburst" that was small enough to not be picked up by the airport weather monitors – a "microburst."

The concept was met with skepticism but after years of collecting data and eventually, enough evidence of microbursts, his findings were taken seriously and adopted by the National Transportation Safety Board. The NTSB instituted the installation of Doppler radars at major airports, pilot training instruction and mandatory pre-flight checks for wind shear. There has not been a U.S. microburst-related plane crash since 1994, undoubtedly saving hundreds or thousands of lives.

We now have a much better understanding of the weather patterns that lead to tornado development and microbursts, better radar depiction of tornado paths as they occur, and substantial early warnings of possible tornadic weather, fortified by "crawls" on TV, warnings on radio and alerts on our smart devices. A lot of the tornado folklore from my childhood has been debunked by science led by Dr. Fujita and continued since his death in 1998. All of this may explain why the death toll from tornadoes has dropped dramatically over the past few decades.

So even though tornadoes like the recent EF-1 (86-110 MPH winds) funnels in Sycamore and Burlington still clench my gut and make me pace the house with anxiety, I

am grateful to Dr. Fujita for his tenacity in unraveling violent weather phenomena, saving lives in the process and easing my terror of tornadic weather ... a little bit.

Kane County Farm Bureau salutes Kevin Veen and the countless farmers like him who

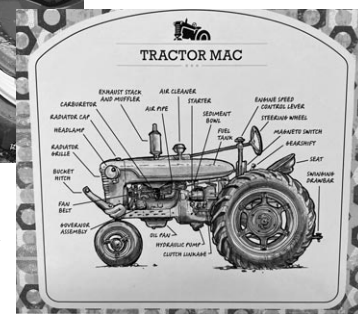
