
The MUMS are back! Fall Harvest Décor arrives in September

The Illinois Sustainable Agriculture Program (IASP) has

released the Edge of Field Incentive Directory for Illinois, a valuable resource for farmers interested in financial and technical assistance for edge-of-field practices. These practices intercept, capture, and treat subsurface drainage or surface runoff at the field level, offering downstream benefits.

The directory includes information on publicly and privately funded programs at federal and state levels, as well as stacking

opportunities to maximize incentives.

By comparing programs side by side, you can find options that suit your unique needs. ISAP's



goal is to raise awareness and provide up-to-date information on Edge of Field opportunities, empowering you to integrate

IFB was asked by American Farm Bureau Federation to join the "Farm Bill for America's Families" campaign recently.

Twenty groups representing agriculture, the environforestry, wildlife, and nutrition joined together to launch the campaign, which promotes the benefits of the Farm Bill encourages lawmakers to pass the bill in 2023.



The educational campaign is geared at urban and suburban consumers, leaders, and lawmakers. Keep in mind that 260 members of Congress have never voted for a Farm Bill. The campaign aims to highlight the Farm Bill's profound impact on the well-being of all Americans, including in areas of:

- · Food security
- Job creation
- Conservation
- Risk management, and

Addressing hunger

Illinois Farm Bureau has joined the campaign and has extended an invitation to county Farm Bureau boards also to join. (Kane County Farm Bureau has submitted a request to AFBF to join the campaign)

We keep our Farm Bill talking points posted within IFB Weekly and on the Leader's Portal. Additionally, our National Affairs team invites you to learn more about our Farm Bill work at ilfb.org > farmer and rural resources > 2023 farm bill. Our official campaign began with planting visits with members of Congress in late March.

2023 Farm Bill Priorities Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) **Farm Bill Priorities**

With the current farm bill set

expire 30, September 2023, IFB has been working with members of the Illinois congressional delegation to ensure our priorities included in the bill. Priorities for the farm bill come directly from the grassroots policy process and reflect

the beliefs and ideas of our membership.

First and foremost, we hope to see a farm bill drafted and enacted before the year is over. IFB believes the farm bill must:

- Maintain current crop insurance programming.
- Be WTO-compliant, provide price and revenue protection for farmers, and link nutrition and commodity programs.
- Maintain both SNAP and TEFAP in their current form.

Title 1 – Commodity programs We Support:

- Allowing farmers to update base acres and yields.
- Increased commodity loan
- Inflation-adjusted farm program payment limits.
- Producers or landowners subject to a new or a previous farm reconstitution - to combine farms or maintain an individual farm number.
- Producers who elect to include HPO should be allowed to receive the harvest price if it is higher on prevented plant acres.

· Dairy risk management programs that address negative price differentials; changing or eliminating state-by-state adjustment factors in Dairy -RP that greatly limited support to producers; improving the accuracy of the DMC feed price component; providing NASS with sufficient resources to estimate alfalfa prices more accurately.

Title II - Conservation **Programs:**

IFB supports improvements USDA Conservation Programs including:

- Five-year CRP contracts.
- · A flexible, renewable oneyear program that pays rates like CRP that incentivize nutrient loss reduction and other programs that incentivize water quality improvements.
- Carbon sequestration incentives for farmers who use cover crops.
- A new water quality credit for producers.
- Using CSP to reward operators for practices they have already adopted and allow them to earn more points for maintaining practices over time.
- Hiring more conservation engineers.
- Providing additional flexibility for harvesting cover crops for feed during normal growing conditions.

Title XI - Crop Insurance:

We support:

Creation of a local or state farmer committee to hear farmer appeals of RMA decisions on overspray and planting dates or on any decision that adversely impacts crop insurance policy holders.

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


Drive-thru BBQs for KCFB Foundation

Illinois is a leading producer of soybeans, corn, and swine. The state's climate and varied soil types enable farmers to grow and raise many other agricultural commodities, including cattle, wheat, oats, sorghum, hay, sheep, poultry, fruits, and vegetables. Illinois also produces several specialty crops, such as buckwheat, horseradish, lima beans, grapes and Christmas trees.

Illinois ranks third nationally in the export of agricultural commodities with \$8.2 billion worth of goods shipped to other countries. Exports

from Illinois account for 6 percent of all U.S. agricultural exports. Illinois is the nation's second leading exporter of both soybeans and feed grains and related products. Approximately 44 percent of grain produced in Illinois is sold for export. The Illinois Department of Agriculture promotes items produced, processed or packaged in Illinois through international and domestic marketing exhibits, trade missions, industry tours, publications, the Illinois Product Logo program and an electronic database for trade leads.

National Farm Safety & Health Week

Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) is again partnering with the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety (NECAS) to promote farm safety and health during National Farm Safety and Health Week, themed, 'No One Can Take Your Place,' Sept. 17-23, 2023.

"We're excited to help promote and support NECAS's efforts in keeping farmers and farm families safe," said Steve Arnold, Manager, Kane County Farm Bureau. "Harvest season can be particularly dangerous for farmers with long hours and stress of weather delays, equipment breakdowns or high operating costs, and this year's activities will reinforce the importance of organizations like ours working together to ensure farmers make it home safely to their families at night."

Each day of the week has a designated topic of focus to promote various aspects of farm



safety:

Health

- Monday, Sept. Equipment and Rural Roadway Safety
- Tuesday, Sept. 19 Health and Wellness
- Wednesday, Sept. 20 -**Priority Populations** • Thursday, Sept. 21
- Confined Spaces • Friday, Sept. 22 - Brain

The 2019 data for the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates that the agricultural sector is still the most dangerous in America with 573 fatalities, or an equivalent of 23.1 deaths per 100,000 workers. Fall harvest

time can be one of the busiest and most dangerous seasons of the year for the agriculture industry. For this reason, the third week of September has been recognized as National Farm Safety and Health Week.

"Farmers are notorious for their work ethic and determination, both qualities that also can be a detriment when it comes to safety," said Arnold. "While farm safety is top of mind every week for farmers, their families and their employees, National Farm Safety and Health Week is an opportunity to spotlight safety reminders that keep those both inside and outside the agriculture industry aware and mindful during the busy harvest season."




The IPPRG bustles with bugs & bees


Book of the month

Are you or a loved one a teacher in Kane County? Have you been searching for new ways to inspire your students? Then you NEED Lesson-In-A-Bucket! KCFB has monthly themed ag-lessons in a 5-gallon chore bucket – yes, like the ones you would find on the farm! Each bucket is loaded with themed books, activities, and Ag-Mags geared toward K-5 classrooms, concentrating on ag topics like apples, pumpkins, and soil.

We couldn't have picked a more perfect topic to kick-off the school year we are running again in September because it was a hot seller last month! So if you missed it, you're in luck! September's Lesson-in-a-Bucket theme is all about Apples. Inspire students with a bucket of lessons about apples and its importance to agriculture including a classroom set of Apple Ag-Mags and Apple Ag-Ventures. Each of the lesson plans inside the bucket lay out the



Equipment

10 minute DIY milk & honey soap

Supplies

2 lb goat milk soap base 5 tbsp raw honey Gold soap colorant 91% isopropyl alcohol, in a spray bottle

Microwave-safe measuring cup 12" silicone honey comb mold

Instructions:

Slice the goat's milk soap base into small cubes and place into a microwave-safe measuring cup. Melt in the microwave in 30second increments, stirring well after each session, to ensure that the soap is completely melted.

Carefully stir in gold soap colorant and honey. Pour the melted soap into the mold and spritz with isopropyl alcohol to remove any air bubbles.

Allow the soaps to sit undisturbed until completely firm (approximately 60-90 minutes depending on temperature and

humidity) before unmolding. See what the buzz is about & enjoy the fruits of your labor!

Transport by Trailer College move-in successful minus the pigs

The gal in the neighboring dorm room rented a U-Haul to transport her belongings to college. Other families had minivans with the back seats removed for their students. We had a pickup truck pulling a livestock trailer that stated the name and location of our farm.

I avoided eye contact with

the upper-classmen helpers as my removed the pin, lifted the bar lock assembly and swung open the rear gate. With ease, the trailer held

bookshelf, mini-fridge, my microwave and television with built-in VCR. I grabbed a lamp and headed to my second-floor room. Perhaps the volunteers didn't realize this rig hauled pigs most other days of the year.

For six consecutive years, livestock trailers hauled my brother or me to college. Later, they moved us to new homes. The trailers were "special-event spotless," or as clean as possible

with a pressure washer and relentless focus on the toughest layers of manure. We cleaned the trailers with the same precision for a shining appearance at the county 4-H fair livestock

My college move-in experience merely represented the norm for a farm kid: Farmers maximizing the potential of their farm equipment. As a child, Mom swam in a large, round livestock water tank, which served the cattle when she and her brothers were done

with it. Old tractor tires became sandboxes. The hayrack doubled as a float in the homecoming parade. We used the farm shop for our wedding reception.

By my senior year, I appreciated the practicality of our pigturned-furniture hauler. Now, our kids witness my tolerance of embarrassment. The minivan (my farm car) has mudflaps and rugged, all-terrain tires. I take an insulated delivery bag into the local pizza places. Mistaken for DoorDash, I explain the bag keeps both pizza and field meals

warm in transit to rural locations. So if you see a livestock trailer backing with ease to the

neighboring sidewalk, admire the skill. Then, just realize it's likely not a cow moving in next door, but rather someone with some unique resources potentially sharable with friends.








THE NIGHTS THAT SAY 'KNEE'

My knees performed well for 65 years, accompanying me on countless miles of walks, acres of stairs, hiking in Washington state, and at Midwestern forest preserves and parks. I have enjoyed walking my whole life and it is one of my favorite things to do, whether in cities, on wooded paths or around my neighborhood.

Last November, my knee became "cranky," grinding, snapping, aching and giving me a weekend of constant pain. A few days later, something inside snapped and the pain was impossible to quell or ignore. A visit to an orthopedic surgeon elicited the following comment, "Yep, that knee is worn out. No cartilage - bone on bone."

And so began my odyssey of education and preparation for total knee replacement, a jaunty title for a rather sobering event. I learned about the possibility of infection in a joint that the body does not recognize as its own, the chance that without commit-

ment to physical therapy, the knee will never have the range of the original model, and that artificial knees last about 20 years with reasonable care.

I am pleased to report that my surgery went smoothly. It was bizarre and disquieting to wake up in recovery and not feel my feet, due to spinal anesthesia. I was amazed that after the spinal block wore off, I was able to slide off the bed, stand up and walk with the aid of a walker on an unfelt, foreign object. I hobbled and clumped around the hospital corridors with my still numb new knee, was instructed about how to manage stairs, and was sent home to recuperate and begin home visit physical therapy.

It's interesting that so many of the body functions one takes for granted - joint movement among them – become the focus of concentration after the joint is replaced. I had to seal my surgery wound in Saran Wrap before showering, think and plan my day around PT appointments and ibuprofen doses, and constantly consider simple movements like getting out of bed, up from a chair, and striding heel-to-toe. All had to be relearned with a new knee.

My knee and I are getting along fairly well now, with the aid of a cane and an "Ice Man" device that pumps cold water through a sleeve over the knee, reducing swelling and easing the aches and pains. The knee chooses 2:00-3:00 a.m. to wake me with aches and pains that are lessened by stretching and flexing at the bathroom vanity, an odd exercise session in the middle of the night. The nights that say knee, indeed.

I am grateful to my sister and friend for alternating visits with me over a two week period, filling my Ice Man, doing laundry, and caring for my confounded cat, who wondered what the heck was wrong with me. I am grateful to my coworkers for their support and for allowing me to concentrate on recovery.

I am thankful that knee replacements are possible, and that I don't have to live with grinding, limping pain for the rest of my life. I look forward to improving enough to resume walking in nature, gardening, and mowing my yard, tasks that have been painful and often impossible for many months. And I look forward to sitting on the sidelines at our For the Future of Farms & Food Gala on September 17th, watching all of you glide across the dance floor with your original equipment knees. See you there, showoffs.
